**News of the Week.**

**NEW BRUNSWICK.**

Among recently granted patents was one to Samuel McIntyre, of Canterbury, York county, for a device for hitching and unhitching horses, and one to David A. Brittain, Westfield, for skidding logs.

J. R. Spragge, mechanical superintendent for five years at McAdam, has been promoted and is about to remove to Toronto.

Mrs. Obed Sears, of Upper Abonsagan Road, about Sackville, attempted to commit suicide last week by taking Paris green. Her husband, died on Thursday, and she has been somewhat despondent. She is the mother of eight children and is about fifty-four years old.

In this city the Daughters of the Empire will on May 24 have a suitably inscribed brass tablet placed upon the building on Queen Street, in which the legislature met from 1788 to 1800.

The Sheriffs of the Counties have all been reappointed.

At the plaster quarries Hillsboro Harry Steeves was badly injured the other day by plaster falling on him, breaking his ankle and shoulder and cutting his face badly, besides injured him internally.

Capt. Geo. R. McDonough has been appointed collector of customs for St. Martins, vice Joseph Carson, deceased.

Five fresh cases of smallpox are reported in the village of Pre d'en haut, about 16 miles from Dorchester. They are all in the same house; There had been quite a number of cases of smallpox in Pre d'en haut during the past winter, but only one death.

Mr. George Robertson, made his report to the Imperial Dock Company Tuesday. No statement has been given to the press. It is however known that the admiralty has declined to assist the enterprise but the company has not yet given up the project.

At Whitehead, Grand Manan, Saturday Coleman George, aged 17 years was drowned by the capsizing of a boat. C. Armsworthy and L. George who were in the boat were rescued.

Twin sons of Sydney Perry, Cole's Island, Q. Co., aged 6 years, were drowned a few days ago. They were playing on some logs at the rivers edge, and fell in.

The St. John harbor fishermen, drift and weir, are getting small catches and all the indications now are that the season will be a poor one.

The Hartland bridge is open for traffic. The toll is twelve cents for double, six cents for single teams, and three cents for foot travellers.

Andrew Grant has been appointed harbor master for Port Elgin.

Alvan Dakin, of Grand Harbour, has been appointed to be a receiver of wrecks and salvage for the district of Grand Manan.

The 14-months-old child of Mr. Chas. Short of Roundhill K. Co. fell into a tub of cold water at its home Tuesday afternoon of last week and was drowned. The parents have the sympathy of the community.

At Sussex Thursday the election as to the installation of water for the fire ward was held with the following result: For water, 143; against, 51.

**NOVA SCOTIA.**

Truro is to have a new academy and an up to date water and sewerage system.

There is friction in the faculty of the Halifax Medical College, and two of the principal members of it have resigned, Drs. N. E. McKay and Murdoch Chisholm.

Lobster fishing is reported to have been unusually good on the Nova Scotia coast. One firm on Pictou Island have already put up nearly 500 cases.

Patrick Hogan, brakeman on the I. C. R. was instantly killed while the train was being shunted at Georges River Thursday. He struck his head against a post and was knocked off the train dead.

A ten years old Amherst boy was last week, sent to jail, for twenty days for habitual truancy from school.

A desperate character, named Frank Sabens is said to be terrorizing the people in Annapolis Co.

John McKenna, one of the Steel company's workmen at Sydney, was badly scalded recently by the upsetting of a car of molten slag.

The Robb Engineering Co., Ltd., of Amherst, has organized a private fire department in connection with their works, with regular officers, meetings and practices.

A high school is to be erected at Sydney Mines to cost \$10,000. The town council have also commenced an agitation for a new post office building.

Native laborers at Port Hood, C. B. do not like the idea of Italians coming to work on the railway, and have taken measures to protect themselves. They went to work and drove the sons of Italy fifteen miles across the country, and threaten something worse should they return.

Professional burglars are at work along Digby Neck; three stores in that vicinity were broken into on Wednesday night.

Cape Breton barristers urge the necessity of appointing a supreme court judge for the island.

The dry goods establishment of McDonald Heurhan and Co., Sydney was damaged by fire to the extent of \$20,000 Saturday.

**OTHER PROVINCES**

Premier Ross of Ontario has announced there will be no provincial election in Ontario this summer.

Twelve Montreal booksellers are charged with selling obscene literature mainly American papers of which the Canadian Government forbids the use of the mails and Customs entry. One of them has been fined. The others may be.

All the employees of the Canadian Locomotive Works at Kingston Ont., about 400 in all, went out on strike Thursday morning. They want an increase in wages from \$1.20 to \$1.25 per day and more pay for extra work.

Counterfeit one-dollar bills have made their appearance again in Toronto. A murder was committed in Ste. Cunegonde, a suburb of Montreal Thursday night. Mrs. Louis Lefebvre was shot through the head and killed by Joseph Leplaine, thirty-six years old, who boarded at the Lefebvre house.

A dispute over a mare worth \$20 in the county of Oxford, Ont., cost \$3,000 in legal expenses to settle the question of ownership.

The steamer Crew, from Sydney, C. B., for Bell Island, Nfld., loaded with iron ore, went ashore Friday afternoon near St. Shots, St. Marys Bay, and is likely to be a total loss.

**UNITED STATES**

George W. Anderson, a potato buyer of Houlton, Me., has disappeared from his home and no trace of him can be found.

All the lumber camps in the northern part of the State of Wisconsin will probably be burned down this summer by order of the Board of Health. During the past two winters many camps have been the breeding places of smallpox and it is feared the disease will develop in more deadly form next winter unless measures are taken for its suppression.

Citizens sabre-slashed; non-union men with broken limbs and bloody faces; women and children trampled under foot; soldiers maimed with flying missiles and leaders in the crowds beaten with muskets were some of the results of the trouble on Wednesday in Albany N. Y., where street railway men are on strike.

The Railroad ticket office at Eastport was wrecked a few days ago by burglars who dynamited the safe and secured about \$200 in money.

Friday Newport, Me., lost over 20 buildings by fire that broke out in the Maine Central freight depot. The loss is estimated at \$20,000.

The derailment of an electric car on the Haverhill, Merrimac and Amesbury brought injuries of greater or less nature to 20 passengers.

Within the past week 58 oil companies have been chartered by the secretary of Texas. The capitalization of these new enterprises reaches the enormous aggregate of \$25,000,000.

**BRITISH AND FOREIGN**

A workmen's pension bill, has been introduced in the French legislature. It provides an annuity of \$72 for a worker of either sex at the age of sixty-five years.

Strikes, accompanied by street disorders, have broken out in St. Petersburg. The police have arrested 132 persons. Several large spinning factories and other establishments are involved.

Friday was the fifteenth birthday of Alfonso, the King of Spain. When he is sixteen he will take over the management of the kingdom.

The British admiralty will lay down in 1901 three battleships of 18,000 tons each, which will be the largest and most powerful vessels of their class ever built.

Frauds and peculations amounting to 31,000,000 roubles have been discovered upon the Russo-Polish and Vistula railways. In Warsaw alone 40 arrests have been made.

The Albany steel strike is over. The strike was of twelve days duration and the total cost of it in all ways today is estimated as follows: Loss of life, two prominent citizens; Cost to company, \$17,423.03; Cost to strikers \$17,820; Cost to county, \$23,000; Total cost \$68,943.03.
