The Victoria General Hospital at Halifax last year had 1,609 patients and the cost of provisions amounted o \$15,295.45.

The proper authorities dismissed the pilot in whose hands the Grecian was when she struck the rocks in Halifax Harbor. They sentence the captain to a suspension of master's certificate for three months.

The Crown Lands Report, presented to the Legislature, shows the receipt in that department for the year, \$91,547.77, a large increase over the estimate of \$35,000.
