NEW BRUNSWICK

The jury in the case of the death of Capt. C. B. Ingalls, returned a verdict exonerating the officers of the Prince Rupert of all blame.

D. P. Kent, who has been for three months boring for water for the I. C. R. near the Moncton station, has reached 1,200 feet but no water is struck yet.

Gilbert McArthur nine year old son of Mrs. Gilbert McArthur, widow, Marysville, drank a pint of gin Sunday 23rd ult. and died Monday night from its effects.

Tuesday Edmund Morgan accused of sealing from A. C. Smith & Co. Carleton St. John was found not guilty, but he was held on two former indictments and on these Judge Forbes sentenced him to four years in Dorchester.

A young man of Swedish extraction committed suicide at Perth. Victoria County, by jumping into an air hole in the St. John river at that point.

Newman Shaw aged 30, married, committed suicide at Windsor, C. Co. by drinking carbolic acid.

The Globe says: The late John W. Slipp left \$500 to the Free Baptist church at Hampstead to build a parsonage, and the remainder of the estate, which will be worth several hundred dollars, to the Deaf and Dumb Institution, Fredericton.

NOVA SCOTIA

Under the will of the late Israel Longworth, Truro, his daughter Marion gets most of the estate, valued at \$100,000, \$2,000 goes to the Mount Allison institutions and \$2,000 for a memorial window in the Charlottetown Methodist church.

Burglars got away with about \$100 worth from the grocery of G. T. McLeod, Truro, Sunday night.

Elizabeth Atkins Etter died at the residence of W. C. Silver Halifax, last week, aged 100 years and nine months.

Another case of smallpox of mild type developed in Halifax last week. The patient is a young woman of 23.

James Munro, night watchman at Waverley gold mines, was killed by an explosion of dynamite Tuesday. He leaves a widow and seven children.

The British schooner Benefit, from Havana, reports the drowning of a sailor, Edward Wheaton, of Hantsport on February 12. He fell overboard.

At a special meeting of the Halifax city council the members, by vote of 9 to 7 decided to retire in a body on April 30 and all offer for re-election, those elected to then remain in for three consecutive years and thus do away with the system of electing six new aldermen each year.

Boring for coal is still going on at Hantsport. They are down 500 feet and fully expect to strike the genuine article when they reach seven or eight hundred feet.

Mrs. Jessie McG. Frazer, Truro, was drowned Thursday night. She had not had good health for some time and in a fit of temporary insanity committed suicide in Salmon River.

A case of smallpox was discovered in Dartmouth Thursday.

When spring opens, 150 men will be employed on shipbuilding operations at Parrsboro. One four-masted and two three-masted schooners, a tug boat and two large barges are being constructed.

The new hospital in Windsor, is to be known as the Payzant Memorial Hospital, in memory of the generous donor, the late G. P. Payzant.

James H. Harris, manager of the Nova Scotia Nursery, was run over by a shunting engine at the Russell street crossing of the I. C. R. Halifax Friday evening and cut in two.

Joseph Boudreau, aged 24, of Charlottetown, mate of the schooner Brilliant at present in Halifax while going on board Friday night fell between the vessel and the wharf and was drowned.

The "Victoria General" Hospital at Halifax last year had 1,609 patients and the cost of provisions amounted to \$15,295.45.

The proper authorities dismissed the pilot in whose hands the Grecian was when she struck the rocks in Halifax Harbor. They sentence the captain to a suspension of master's certificate for three months.

The Crown Lands Report, presented to the Legislature, shows the receipt in that department for the year, \$91,547.77, a large increase over the estimate of \$35,000. The estimated surplus was \$20,000, but the actual surplus was \$74,847.24, the largest, with one exception, in the history of the Province.

The new cases of smallpox which have broken out in Halifax and Dartmouth are said to be traceable to a steamer which arrived in port a short time ago with the disease on board.

OTHER PROVINCES

There is said to be much destitution in St. John's Nfld.

The Manitoba Board of Health states that the smallpox epidemic is now a thing of the past in the province.

Captain Warren was tried at Georgetown P. E. I. for manslaughter of Dennis Brown, Annandale, and was sentenced to four years in Dorchester.

In Montreal Thursday morning Isadore Turcot, after a night of drunkenness, threw a lighted lamp at his wife and she was so badly burned that she will, probably, die. He then took carbolic acid, and died in a little while.

Tuesday Illestobres Seigl, at the Carmelite monastery at Falls View Ont. went into a stall of a Jersey bull to feed it. The bull attacked him, knocking him down and trampled him to death.

The provincial board of health announces that during February 707 cases of smallpox were reported in Ontario. Twenty-two counties were affected.

UNITED STATES

As the result of a collision on the Auburn branch of the New York Central seven miles west of Auburn, between a west-bound passenger train and a steam derrick seven trainmen are dead and two others missing.

Saco, Me., schools are to be closed on account of the prevalence of small pox.

Great floods are reported in the Southern States. There has been no loss of life.

Mental derangement caused Aleck Ikev, a prosperous farmer of Wells, Vt., to kill his wife with an axe on Thursday.

The most terrible snow slide ever known in Colorado, caused the deaths of from 30 to 75 men at the Liberty Bell mine on Smuggler mountain Friday. Nearly all the buildings of the liberty mine were carried down by the avalanche.

Joseph Wilfrid Blondin, accused of the murder of his wife near Boston, Mass., last June by cutting off her head, was arrested in New York Tuesday. He had gone to headquarters to take an examination for an engineer's license.

So far as known seven lives have been lost and several persons injured in the storm of Friday in the south-eastern states. The damage is enormous, the railroads being heavy sufferers.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

The condition of King Leopold, of Belgium, causing anxiety. The physicians in attendance on his majesty deny that his symptoms are serious but the frequency of their visits have given rise to disquieting rumors.

Influenza has London at its mercy. Half a dozen members of the government, including A. J. Balfour, the government leader in the house of commons are laid up. Sir Thomas Lipton, Lord Roberts and about thirty members of the house of commons and other notable people are among the patients.

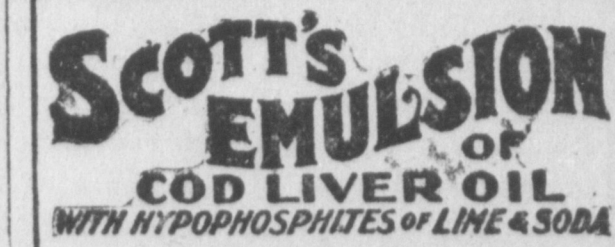

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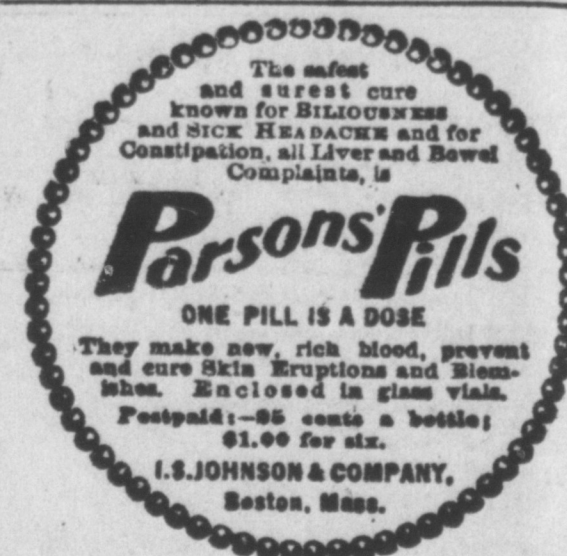
