

Admiral Sampson, of the United States Navy died on Tuesday of last week. The controversy as to the relative merits of Admiral Schley and himself worried him and doubtless hastened his death.

Thirty thousand Norwegians have fled to America this year.

The executive committee of the manufacturers' association has decided to invite the premiers of Australia, New Zealand and Canada and some members of the British Cabinet to attend the annual meeting to be held in Halifax next August.

Russia's coercive measures in Finland have reached such an extreme of cruelty that an agitation has begun in many quarters looking toward the interference of the European powers in behalf of the unfortunate inhabitants. The farmers are emigrating in large numbers, an average of well up to a thousand leaving every week.

CONCENTRATION OF FORCE

I have read the letter of Bro. Long, with much interest in hope of obtaining some new light on a somewhat old question, but I think I shall be justified in the conclusion that no thing new has been presented. That does not imply for a moment, that Bro. Long's presentation is not worthy of consideration, far from it, but simply that each point made, is but that so often said, and heard in the past, which does not wrought the desired conviction secured the needed adhesion. Bro. Long, of course, understands that he has not given the whole case, either from a theoretical, or practical standpoint, but, he has given strong reasons in his view of the case from his standpoint. And it is well to look at them. The claim is made that as Baptists should be organically one. Why? Because (1) the causes of separate organizations are of the past. Now, is that the fact? Bro. Long explicitly states: "The doctrines which the others contended against are not now taught." Can that be said broadly? Within a few months I have heard the doctrine of a limited atonement; still know full well others of the same denomination taught the doctrine of a general atonement.

Grant as to essential faith we are to-day, save as to the communion, not that true as to others? The aim of Baptism does not make us one! Bro. Long knows our form as Baptists is not confined to any one angelical denomination. Essentially we are one with all Christian believers.

But, as distinctive immersionists emphasizing that phase of truth, as to believer's Baptism, we are near to each other. Further, in our view of the Lord's Supper, both as to teaching and practice, we are just in the fathers' position. Has there generally been a change within the house we are asked to enter? And, that both as to doctrine and practice? Fully aware of the distances approaching to our faith and practice, but can it be said that, that faith and practice all round is general? The answer must be no! Yes! but it will be said in union there must be a lessening looking to a larger good. The answer to that is why concession? And why organic union to obtain that larger good? Swiftly the reply will be because one strong interest is better than two weak ones. Suppose that is granted, how if in making the strong interest you have suffered loss? A loss not compensated for in the good obtained.

More looking at things as they are, the after case can be cited that the proposed union would result in less active work than is being done to-day. But, to hark back to the main point. As Free Baptists our faith and the communion is of a piece with the rest of our belief. "Free" is the word, both as to faith, spirit and practice. From the first to this day our position has been our stronghold. That position goes beyond a form of polity. Well! is it in this day in the way in the good interests of the kingdom, to narrow that position? If on all other points there is a concession, where is that oneness acknowledged to be expressed? Not merely a form but as to essential spirit. Is not that Lord's table? And, the LORD'S TABLE, where is the

Scriptural prohibition of any renewed child of God? To narrow at the Table, is to strike at the central feature of our distinctive position as a people. The very genius, spirit, of our entire organization is in protest against that which is so truly expressed by the word—Free.

And let this be said, Compromise on so essential, distinctive character,istic as a people, is to some out of the question.

Then (2) reference is made to the union of the Methodist family, and the Presbyterian family in this Dominion, what divided them? So far as I know questions of polity. That I think is the fact. Our position is entirely different. In polity practically we are one. But are we in spirit in that "freedom" that belongs to a "kingdom," where it can be expressed, namely, at the Lord's Table?

And (3) is our Lord's Prayer for oneness, organic union? Are not all believers in and lovers of the Lord Jesus Christ, one in Christ to-day? When has the universal and visible church been one except in the sense named?

Very remarkable Roman, Greek, Anglican Churches are pleading that prayer, overlooking the fact that the oneness is comprehensive of all churches, and even beyond that, in the Spirit and Law of Christ Jesus. And, further be it said beyond any question the mourned divisions of the past: have been to the glory of God, and the extension of His Kingdom.

Still all know that as Bro. Long states that where possible unity of force in organic relations is wise and commendable. Is it wise in our position? Bro. Long says Yes! I have given but a part of the case of those who think it is not, and already I have taken up too much space. So perhaps you will kindly allow me in another letter to refer to other features, and to conclude with the sincere hope that the question will be by us all kept on the level and plane of what is best for not alone one side or the other, but for Christ's Kingdom.
