**A Clean Life as a Christian Endeavorer.**

A clean life is much to be desired and like anything truly valuable, costs not always in dollars and cents but in something that is of far more value, namely: self-sacrifice, persistent labor, undying faith in God and never-ceasing conflicts with Satan. The pathway of life is strewn with filth and litter, sin in every form. The devil has his traps set thickly along the way, snares that allure the thoughtless youth on, on, down the broad road to destruction, over which he may never return.

A clean life as a Christian Endeavorer means, in my opinion, the cleanest, purest, godliest life that it is possible for a human being to live while here on earth. Christian Endeavor, means endeavoring to be a Christian, which is the highest of all endeavors because the idea is the highest. The word endeavor itself means labor, time and strength. Christian Endeavor means all this and more; it means giving self to Christ and constant labor in His behalf and for His cause. A room may appear to be perfectly clean when the curtains are down and the sun hidden by heavy clouds but when the curtains are thrown up and the bright rays of the sun bring into bold relief every object in that room we are surprised to see filth, dust dirt and cobwebs that we had entirely overlooked before. It is just the same with a Christian Endeavorer. Standing in the light of the Almighty God, the dark corners of our souls are lit up and secret sins that may have been hiding there are brought to view and exposure. The more the world expects of us, the greater is our responsibility and the more arduous our labor. If we acknowledge Christ as our Saviour, we must also acknowledge His enemies as our enemies and live accordingly.

Temperance in all things is expected of every Christian Endeavorer; not only in things pertaining to intoxicating liquors, but in dress, habits, pleasure, work, in everything there must be temperance, godliness, prayerfulness and many evidences of cleanliness and purity. The world expects much of every Christian Endeavorer and it has a right to do so, for, whoever takes the Christian Endeavor pledge must do considerable if he keeps his obligations. No active member of any Christian Endeavor society can dress gaudily, flashily, over expensively attend dances, operas, cheap shows, keep late hours, waste his or her time foolishly, read dime novels attend the parks and places of amusement on the Sabbath, frequent the saloons and places of disgrace, betray a friend or deceive an enemy. These things are the characteristics of the worldly people and Christian Endeavor means the renouncing of the devil and cleaving to Christ and the Cross. "By their fruits ye shall know them."

Show me a Christian Endeavorer who attends dances, theaters, horse races, shows; who frequent saloons dresses flashily, keep late hours, reads trashy literature, wastes his or her time in foolish games and idle recreation and I will show you a Christian Endeavorer who is not keeping the pledge, who is not a Christian, only a cheap imitation and whose life is as filthy in the sight of God as the worst drunkard in the gutter; yea, I believe more filthy, because the drunkard makes no pretensions, does not pose before the world as a disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ and therefore does not use religion as a cloak behind which to hid his meanness. Intemperance is a terrible sin; the worst of all sins, no doubt, and is yearly dragging thousands of souls down to perdition yet I firmly believe that a person may never enter a saloon and yet be a terrible sinner in the sight of God and receive just as severe a punishment in the hereafter as the poor drunkard. Every soldier in the army of the Union during the late war was expected to be steady

fast and true to his country and his flag at all times and at all places; but more especially in time of danger, at the eve of a great battle, in the heat of the conflict when lead and steel were raining thick and fast about him and death seemed almost certain. Had he flinched here, had he deserted, he would have been court-martialed and shot, if captured. It is just so with every Christian Endeavorer. The fight is on; the battle is at hand, the opposing forces are mustering, there cannon mutter in the distance: on they come with a great sweep and glitter of armor; their banner of the great Dragon. Arise, Christian Endeavorers, arise and if your soul is right with God and your life clean and acceptable in His sight, he bids you follow Him, soldiers of the cross, with your banner fluttering in the breeze. You cannot, you must not idle a moment; come and with united ideas and plans and with God's help, we must go out and on and in the face of the enemy we must throw hot shot and shell and never break ranks or waver until the victory is ours. How can we do this? How? There is but one way. Live right every day and by our example help others to see and be convinced that to live a Christian is a glorious life to live and worthy of imitation. Unless we do this, unless we can live lives before the people that will lead them to seek the Saviour and join the ranks of the great army of Salvation, alas, I say, we can do this, the great organization of the Y. P. S. C. E. is a failure so far as the purpose for which it was organized is concerned.

It is hard to clean a dirty window pane with a filthy cloth; so every Christian Endeavorer must lead a clean life and not only avoid evil but the appearance of evil, if we would accomplish the purpose for which we are organized and help our weaker brothers to the foot of the cross. Our example is constantly before the eyes of the public, every hour and every day and the little things of life are what count for most, they are what the world watches most especially, that it may catch us napping. The amount of good or evil we are doing every day by our example we cannot know or even estimate and the Lord will not hold us guiltless if we cause a weaker brother to stumble by our poor example. Christ's life was a clean life and every Endeavorer who would lead a clean life must of necessity keep before him his example and model, the Saviour of the world, Christ Jesus. With Him for our example and for our Saviour, and God our Heavenly Father, leaning on him for health, strength and wisdom, we as Christian Endeavorers, separately and unitedly can lead clean lives and let our lives so shine that their rays though feeble, may light some fallen neighbor on to glory.

Let us then remember that it is the common every day life, our actions and manner of dealing with the public in business, in pleasure, in joy, in sorrow, in temptation, in tribulation, at home and away from home, every day and hour of our lives, the way we spend our time, money and strength; the way we treat our neighbors our enemies and ourselves; our sociability, the way we conduct ourselves in time of great temptation, these are the things that prove the character and life of every Christian Endeavorer, search for the secret sins and filthy places in our inward lives and place us in a position before the world to do either great good or great evil by our influence and example. Here is the summing up of the whole matter: take Christ for our model and example, trust Him, love Him, lean on Him, pray to Him earnestly for wisdom and strength and reflect out to the world the light He sheds on us and peace will be ours and our souls will be as clean and white as the driven snow. This is my conception of a clean life as a Christian Endeavorer.—Selected.
