New Brunswick.

The Coroner's jury in the Oulton case brought a verdict that Isaac G. Oulton was murdered by a person or persons unknown.

Seven stalls at the St. Stephen driving park were destroyed by fire Tuesday. Partial insurance. Supposed to have been set by tramps.

Hon. L. P. Farris has purchased seven stock stallion for the provincial government. The average cost was \$500 a head. Three were purchased in Quebec, two in Ontario and two in Maine.

The horses recently purchased by the local government cost an average of over \$1500 each, not \$500 as at first reported. A costly lot.

At Blackville, North Co., Monday of last week fire broke out in the building known as the old division hall, but lately used as the Methodist church down stairs and a gymnasium in the upper portion. The building was completely destroyed.

Theodore Estabrooks has been appointed one of the board of governors of the Boys' Industrial Home, St. John to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Thomas H. Hall.

Woodstock's three small-pox patients are doing nicely.

The C. P. R. are building ten cottages for their employes at McAdam. James Ross nearly 112 years old, died at St. Martins Saturday.

The residence of John Fraser, a prominent farmer of Covered Bridge, Nashua, was destroyed by fire Friday morning, with all its contents.

A few days ago, William Brown, employed at G. G. Scoble's portable saw mill, at Little River, Sunbury, was caught in the haul-up chain on the

slip and the flesh torn off one of his legs below the knee and the foot wrenched completely off. The young man died the day after he was hurt.

At Tweedside, York Co., on Monday, last week, John M. Swan, of the Swan Company, had his right leg cut off near the body in the company's saw mill that afternoon. He fell against one of the saws, and died the next day. His son, Geo. Swan, was badly injured in the mill the day before. Walking over a board, across the beams, the board broke and he was precipitated eight or nine feet to the floor. Part of the broken board was driven into his thigh.

Woodstock had a disastrous fire on Tuesday of last week, destroying seven buildings on Main St. between Church and Connell. The burnt out are, John McAfee, tin smith; Messrs Hill & McLeod, dressmakers; Gardner Bros., drug store; L. E. Young, law office; Miss Boyer, ladies emporium; Mrs. John Loane, bookstore; T. Collins, fancy goods; Dr. Pugley's dental rooms; H. N. P. yson, grocer; Blake's restaurant. The total loss is about \$36,000, with half insurance.

Nova Scotia.

J. Boyd McNeil, of Weymouth, has been appointed registrar of deeds for Digby county.

J. Awalt, convicted of burning the post office at French Village, was sentenced to ten years' imprisonment.

Acadia Mines narrowly escaped being wiped out of existence by fire. The large three story store of S. H. Smith, warehouse of D. R. Smith and five other buildings were destroyed. Origin of the fire unknown.

Tenders are being asked for the construction of a public building at Arichat; for the erection of an armoury at Middleton; and for the construction of a new academy of brick and stone at Truro.

There live on Mira River, Cape Breton, eight persons that have seen the reign of five crowned heads on the English throne.

Wm. Mann, of Mann and Mackenzie, says the firm will begin construction work on the Halifax and Yarmouth railway, almost immediately.

Halifax has another case of smallpox. The patient is employed in the Acadia Sugar Refinery.

Recount in the Halifax mayoralty contest increased Crosby's majority from 16 to 20.

The new court house about to be erected at Kentville will be built of pressed brick with trimmings of Nova Scotia freestone with metal roof and cornices.

Other Provinces.

William McBleer, of Bedeque road, P.E.I., an old man, while building a load of hay fell, breaking his neck.

Minnie and Fannie Fitzpatrick were drowned in the Ottawa river near Westmeath a few days ago. They were in a row boat with their brother and his wife. The wife became frightened and jumped overboard. Her husband followed to save her and the boat containing the two girls drifted into rapids and they were drowned.

Fitzpatrick and his wife reached the shore.

According to the assessment commissioner the city realty assessment now totals \$23,912,060, with \$6,558,210 exemptions. The population is placed at 48,397.

Max Hartz, of Montreal, commercial traveller, was found lying dead in his home Thursday. Apparently he had been dead for ten days. His wife was away from home.

Reports from all parts of Quebec province and eastern Ontario say fruit trees and all early grain and vegetation suffered severe damage from frost Friday night. In a few places considerable snow fell. It was the severest cold wave known in many years.

Arthur Sweatman, son of Bishop Sweatman, of Toronto, was killed by a fast Grand Trunk train, in front of which he deliberately threw himself. A note was found pinned to clothing, avowing his intention to commit suicide. Much ill health, it is said had unbalanced his mind.

United States.

At Harrisburg, Pa., Tuesday, four men were killed, two fatally injured and two others were terribly burned by being caught in a torrent of molten metal at the Pennsylvania Steel Works.

A disastrous fire wiped out the entire business portion of the town of New Milford, Conn., and did damage to the amount of at least \$100,000 on Monday.

In northern New York fruit trees and early vegetables and grain suffered severely from frost Friday.

At Pittsburg, Pa., Mrs. Catharine S. Hall, who released the Biddell brothers from jail last January, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

Paul Liecester Ford, the novelist, was shot and killed Thursday at New York by his brother, Malcolm Webster Ford, writer and athlete, who then sent a bullet into his own breast, dying instantly. It is said that there was enmity between the two brothers of 11 years' standing. This alleged enmity is said to have been because their father disinherited Malcolm.

British and Foreign.

A despatch from St. Thomas, D. W. I., says the flow of lava from the volcano on Mount Pelee, west end of Martinique, has completely destroyed the Guerin factories, about two miles from St. Pierre. It is reported that 150 persons have disappeared. A panic prevails.

The earthquake in Guatemala on April 18 killed more than 1,000 people and rendered 30,000 homeless.

Two hundred and fifty fishermen are reported drowned in a gale which has made havoc of the herring fishing fleet on the west coast of Japan last week.

A train loaded with Belgian pilgrims on their way to Lourdes was derailed near Moyenneville, France, while the train was at full speed. Nine persons were killed and many injured.

Calcutta is to be improved driving wide, open thoroughfares through the slums of the city at a cost of nearly \$10,000,000.

Violent earthquake shocks at three o'clock Sunday morning reported from Bordeaux, Bayonne, Paul and other places in the same region. They lasted fifteen seconds. The reports do not mention any damage.

The central cone of Mount Vesuvius suddenly collapsed Friday evening, and a large gap is now seen toward Pompeii. Long and very deep cracks have also made their appearance along the sides of the volcano. Professor

Mattei, of the Vesuvian observatory, says the collapse will be followed soon by startling volcanic manifestations resulting in the formation of a new cone in the direction of Naples. Considerable alarm is felt by the inhabitants.

The recent fire at the Town of Bobruisk, in the Province of Minsk, destroyed 972 houses and 650 small streets. Bobruisk, which is situated 88 miles south-east of Minsk, has a population of about 55,000 souls.
