NEW BRUNSWICK

Monday of last week Noble Steeves was killed at the King plaster quarry at Hillsboro by a fall of earth and plaster. George Bulmer of Hillsboro and John Dee of Demoiselle were badly injured, the former having his hip broken. Mr. Steeves was about 45 years of age and leaves a wife and family.

Miss Ann Hubbard, who died at Burton, Sunbury county, a few days ago, was one of the oldest residents of the province. She had reached the age of 96 years.

A freight train on the I. C. R. was derailed two miles west of Memramcook Monday. Several loaded cars went off the track. Engine, cars and track much damaged, but no life lost.

Andrew Ramsey, aged fifty-four, North End St. John, committed suicide Wednesday morning by cutting his throat. He has been in poor health and dependent.

Two large wolves are said to have been seen at Royal Road, York County recently.

Howard McIntyre of Otnabog while hauling hay from Musquash Island had his horses drowned. The ice gave way while he was crossing Musquash Lake.

In this city Tuesday evening fire in the wholesale grocery and feed store of John Gibson & Son did damage to the building and stock to the extent of \$1,000.

A company is about forming at Seal Cove, Grand Manan, to purchase the steamer Westport, now running to that place from Nova Scotia, and placing her on the route between Seal Cove, Grand Manan, Eastport and St. Stephen.

Mrs. E. McCarron, Hampton, had her left foot so badly crushed by a train, that it had to be amputated. She had a letter which she was desirous of mailing on the C. P. R. that had just arrived. She was obliged to cross the track to reach the station platform. All crossings were blocked by a long special freight train which lay between her and the C. P. R. express. As the freight was stationary she ventured to crawl beneath but while doing so the cars started, resulting in the crushing of her foot.

Wednesday morning the Str. Prince Rupert, going out of St. John on her trip to Digby ran into the Schr. Princess Louise, which was at anchor near the red buoy. The Schr. was completely wrecked and her Captain and owner, C. B. Ingalls of Grand Harbour, Grand Manan, was drowned. The only other man on the Schr, L. Zwicker, was rescued by a boat which put off from Partridge Island. A thick vapour covered the harbour, so that it was impossible to see anything. The rescued men says Capt. Ingalls was blowing a horn when the Schr. was struck. Captain Ingalls was about 48 years of age, and leaves a wife and son. He was well known in St. John and was a very worthy and respected man.

Governor Snowball has leased the house of Mr. H. Beckwith, and will occupy it during the session of the Legislature and part of the year as an official residence. The Bank of New Brunswick intends opening a branch at East Florenceville, C. Co. very soon. Some disputes having arisen among Lunatic Asylum, officials, and the assistant physician having made charges against the Superintendent, the government has appointed the Attorney General to investigate. Two large grey wolves are reported to have been seen near Edward Whelpley's Public Landing, Thursday. They came within one hundred yards of the barnyard. Before Mr. Whelpley could get his gun they were gone. Saturday evening, fire in Dr. McLeod's house, this city, did considerable damage to two rooms and their contents.

Halifax is going to take \$75,000 from Andrew Carnegie for a public library.

At Glace Bay, C. B., Monday, miners were burned in Caledonia mines. Their pit lamps ignited an accumulation of gas. Though badly burned none of them are expected to prove fatal. The mine will not suffer in any way. The Intercolonial depot, Halifax, improvements will cost about \$60,000 and must be completed by June next.

UNITED STATES

The loss by the Paterson, N. J. fire is now estimated at \$8,000,000 to \$10,000,000. Insurance about two thirds.

A fire in a third-story lodging house at St. Louis caused the death of eleven persons, ten men and one woman, and dangerously injured eight others. Ten or more who had narrow escapes from

Monetary Times, Toronto says: It is now stated that the Sissiboo Pulp and Paper Co., of Nova Scotia, which defaulted in its payment of interest on bonds in October last, is now rapidly getting its affairs into good shape again.

Halifax leads all Atlantic ports in the shipment of apples to Europe this season. Figures issued show that the Furness, Allan and Donaldson lines of steamers carried 187,585 barrels. In addition, many shipments were sent via St. John, Montreal and Boston, so that the total shipments from Nova Scotia this year will exceed 200,000 barrels. A considerable stock is still held by growers. The price now ruling is \$5 a barrel for first class fruit, an unusually high figure.

Mrs. Pearce, a colored woman, died of smallpox at Halifax Wednesday.

At Halifax Tuesday, inland revenue officers found a whiskey still in full operation in the cellar of A. N. Brunson Brunswick street. A man was working it when officers entered the place. The still was seized and also several barrels of liquor.

The annual statement of the Halifax Electric Tram Company, just issued shows earnings for the year 1901 to have been \$79,232 as compared with \$74,632 for the previous year.

Mrs. Donald Campbell, who is thought to have been the oldest woman in Nova Scotia, died at St. Peter's, C. B., on Monday last. Mrs. Campbell was 109 years of age.

Electricity did fatal work at blast furnace No. 3 Sydney Wednesday afternoon. Robert Glover, of St. Stephen, N.B., 20 years of age, met his death by being struck by a live wire, which broke and fell on him. Death was almost instantaneous.

Fire at Pictou, Sunday morning destroyed the building occupied by George McLaren as a furniture store. Most of the stock was saved. Insured.

OTHER PROVINCES

There are now sixty-five cases of smallpox in the Montreal Civic Hospital and twenty-one houses under quarantine.

A snow hut that some boys in Quebec were building caved in. One of the boys, named Wm. Sailer, was suffocated before he could be dug out.

The winter herring fishing at Pictou Bay, Newfoundland, now over, has proved the very worst on record the continued mild weather making it impossible to freeze the fish.

Since May 289 cases of small-pox have been admitted to the Montreal civic hospital, and of that number not one had been vaccinated. There are now 64 cases under treatment and there are 14 houses under quarantine. The health officials are rigidly enforcing the vaccination law in factories by personal inspection.

At Winnipeg the preliminary trial of Walter Gordon for the murder of Daw and Smith, at Whitewater Thursday. The prisoner's identity was proven and he was committed for trial. He is the man who was arrested at Halifax.

All hope of saving the Allan steamer Grecian, ashore near Halifax, has been given up by the owners and she is being stripped.

A freight wreck is reported near Somerset, Pa., on the Pennsylvania railroad. Three are killed and six injured.

A runaway horse dashed through the window of a one-story building on Upper Broadway, New York, Tuesday, upset a stove and set fire to the place in which were two men, one of them being burned to death.

Ten men were injured in an explosion of a dynamite cartridge at some railway work, at North Andover Mass., on Friday. The cause of the explosion is unexplained.

So far as they can get at it now, the insurance men of Paterson believe the loss all told will amount to no more than \$6,000,000.

Seven men were killed and at least fourteen were seriously injured by a huge boulder, weighing 15 tons, which crashed into the caboose of a work train on the Oklahoma and Gulf railroad, Ark, Friday.

Saturday show a grand total for the year 1902-03 of £69,310,000, which is intended to provide 420,000 men, 219,700 men are for the ordinary army service and 200,300 for war service. The estimates, of which £40,000,000 is required for war, show a decrease under this head of £23,230,000 compared with 1901-02. A memorandum of the war secretary, Mr. Brodrick, explains that the estimates are sufficient to maintain a field force in South Africa, of the present strength for eight or nine months of the new financial year.

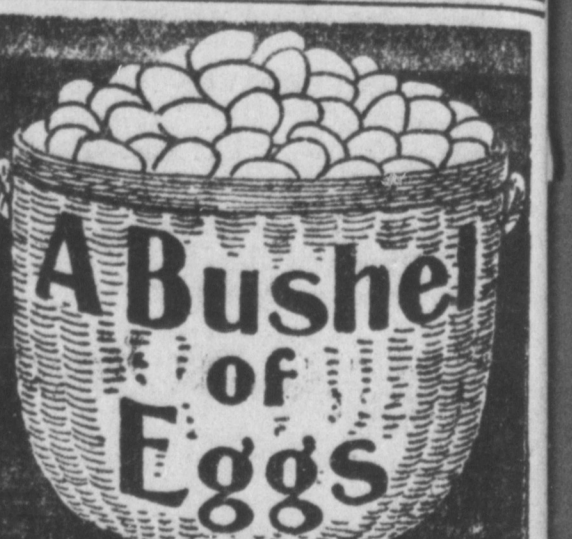
