News of the Week

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Provincial Board of Health at a meeting last week passed a resolution approving compulsory vaccination of all children attending the public schools and of all pupils attending educational institutions.

The expenditure in connection with the small pox in St. John has been about \$17,800, exclusive of the purchase of the Morland farm, which increases the expenditure to about \$25,000. Of the \$17,000, \$5,941.45 went to physicians who were employed for public vaccination, and \$802 for vaccine. Other expenses in connection with vaccination such as special officers to serve notices, legal proceedings etc., will make the expenditure on vaccination over \$5,000. There were in all 102 cases of small pox.

James Gray, aged 87 years, of Pembroke Co., a few days ago by being crushed between the wheels and the body of the wagon, died from the effect of his injuries.

During the last fortnight four hundred and fifty tons of pulp have been shipped to England by the St. John Sulphite Co.

Aubrey Ray, aged 25 years, a resident of Great Salmon River, was drowned there last evening while attempting to cross the river with two other persons.

Mr. Forrester, an English farmer at present living at Springhill, ploughed up an acre of land on Monday, March 24th. This is said to be the earliest spring ploughing ever recorded in York county.

Herring are reported plentiful in Grand Manan waters, but the weather of late has been such as to make it impossible for fishermen to go out after them.

One of the smallpox patients at Partridge island St. John, a man by the name of Macrae, died, Wednesday. The rest of the patients are doing well.

The big ice jam between Springhill and Hawkshaw of which so much has been heard, is now a thing of the past. It has been gradually going to pieces for some days, and Saturday's rain gave it impetus Saturday evening the jam extended from Springhill to Long's Creek, a distance of 13 miles. Daylight, Monday, found the river open between these points, the ice and logs have quietly disappeared during the night. It is estimated that 15,000,000 feet of logs have passed this city since Wednesday.

A highway robbery was committed on the Moore's Mills road, six miles from St. Stephen Wednesday evening. Herbert Mann was driving from town and while stooping to drink he was attacked by two men, who knocked him down and took his clothes a pocket book containing \$98.

Joseph Crandall for fifty years Postmaster at Moncton, died Saturday, aged 81.

NOVA SCOTIA

Marconi has arranged to build his wireless station at Table Head, within the town limits of Glace Bay. Rhodes Curry & Co. have secured the contract to erect four towers, each 200 feet high, of hard pine. The buildings will cover 600x600 feet of ground and cost between seventy and eighty thousand dollars. The town council has contracted to supply the station with 4,000 gallons of water an hour, and guarantee non-interference by any electric plant or tramway within a third of a mile of the station.

As a result of Wednesday's storm the str. Grecian, stranded at Herring Cove, was completely wrecked and broken up.

Two new cases of small pox developed Monday, one in Dartmouth, the other in Halifax.

The British commanding officer for North America, stationed at Halifax, is in future not to be a general. The chief responsibility for the management of British military affairs in Canada will be vested in a colonel. The new staff for the imperial forces, with headquarters in Halifax, was arranged today as follows: Colonel Sir Charles Parsons, colonel in command; Colonel Booth, deputy assistant adjutant general; Major Semini, deputy assistant quartermaster general.

It has been decided that the next maritime winter fair will be held at Amherst, as early as possible in the month of December next.

The Dominion Department of Agriculture, and the Governments of the Maritime Provinces have promised aid. All the educational features of the last exhibition will be enlarged upon, and the best live stock specialists will be secured as judges and lecturers.

Peter Kelly, a driver on the Midland Railway, was seriously injured Friday night at Kennetcook while coupling cars. He fell upon the track and several cars passed over one arm, crushing it. The opposite shoulder was smashed and his jaw was also broken by a blow from an axle bar.

The six bridges spanning the Tusket River, including the main one between that village and Yarmouth, have been carried away. The latter one and two others are of steel.

The Provincial Legislature prorogued Thursday, Tuesday afternoon the mem-

bers of the House of Assembly presented an address to Thomas Robertson, Speaker. Accompanying it was a purse containing over \$400. Mr. Robertson will take a trip abroad.

The six lady teachers who will go to South Africa from Nova Scotia have been selected as follows: Miss Cran-Gall of Walton, Miss Maggie De Wolfe of Halifax, Miss Emma Ellis of Dartmouth, Miss Bertha Hebb of Bridgewater, Miss McDonald of Hopewell, and Miss Helen McKenzie of Pictou.

A company has been incorporated to build an electric railway between Digby and Yarmouth. This line, it is presumed, will go through the shore settlements as the D. A. R. is some miles back.

Capt. Angus Stewart, who had been spending the winter at home, in Cape Breton, started for New York a few days ago to take charge of a vessel. He drank with his friends before starting. When the conductor of the train wanted his ticket, he had none, though he had purchased it. He was put off the train. The next train that came along ran over him and killed him. One more victim of the rum traffic.

OTHER PROVINCES

Henry Grant, who represents one of the colonization companies, which has purchased large tracts of land in Assiniboia, anticipates the immigration of at least ten thousand people from the Northwestern States to the Canadian West this year. Already, he estimates, three thousand people have passed into Canada over the Soo line.

A large number of counterfeit Dominion \$2 notes, are in circulation in the province of Quebec. The words "Dominion of Canada" are not so distinct as on the genuine notes.

Two freight trains running over the Grand Trunk Air line collided near Jarvis, Ont., Friday. The Engine drivers and a brakeman were killed. The loss in rolling stock is heavy.

Newfoundland has a revenue of \$2,000,000. Surplus over expenditure \$35,000.

The sealing steamer Southern Cross put into the harbor of Green's Pond, Nfld., Wednesday, with only 70 seals on board. The Southern Cross did not sight ice, the seal herds or any other sealing steamers during her entire voyage. Hers is the second total failure among the sealing fleet this season.

Col. Dent states he has shipped 9,111 Canadian horses to South Africa and expects to ship 800 more early in April.

The steamer Newfoundland, the first sealing ship to return from the ice floes, reports that the season's fishery was the worst on record. The gloomy outlook is confirmed by fuller reports. The scattered condition of the ice floes and the soft and foggy weather operate against the efforts of the sealers.

Arthur Lindsay, chief clerk in the Postmaster General's department, Ottawa, has not been seen for more than a week. He was last in his office on Thursday, 20th inst., and no explanation of his absence has been received. The deputy minister says there is nothing wrong with Lindsay's work.

UNITED STATES

In New York, Wednesday, Albert T. Patrick, lawyer, was convicted of the murder on Sept. 23, 1900, of the aged millionaire, William Marsh Rice.

J. Steinman, a convicted burglar in Wisconsin, declared that he was the accomplice of Czolgosz, and that he

had bound the handkerchief about the murderer's hand in his preparation for the deed; that he was near Czolgosz when the latter fired the shot and was already with two revolvers to do the work if Czolgosz failed.

Glanders has recently caused the death of many horses in New York. In one large stable half the horses were found to have glanders, and were killed.

Three dead and six injured is the result of a collision on the Joliet and Chicago Electric Railway to-day.

There are great floods in the Southern States, Railway traffic is suspended and many farms are submerged.

It is reported that a boat containing 21 men going to a British trans. port anchored in the river opposite New Orleans, capsized, drowning ten or more men.

A terrific rain, wind and electrical storm passed through Tupelo, Miss. and neighboring county Friday. Seventy-five negro cabins and a negro church, were blown down.

A loss of \$60,000 resulted from a fire Friday in Boston. The building burned was occupied by Redding, Baird & Co., artists and workers in leaded and stained glass.

A storm prevailed the eastern slope of the Rocky Mountains in Colorado. At some points on the mountains the storm reached the proportions of a blizzard. Cattle on the ranges in the northeastern portions suffered severely.

Small pox was discovered in one of Dwis's buildings in Chicago, and 187 Dowiettes are quarantined.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN

It is reported that nearly a thousand deaths from cholera have occurred at Mecca since March 23rd.

A census gives Berlin's population as 1,901,567; increase during the last year, 12,857, against an increase of 42,403 for the preceding year.

According to a return published recently, the Parliamentary electors

in the United Kingdom number at present 6,891,093.

The deaths from accidents in coal mines all over the world during 1900 came to 4,012. Of this total 1,144 occurred in the British Empire, including 993 in the United Kingdom.

During the last ten years the orchard area in England had been increasing at the average rate of 3,000 acres per annum; and the present area alone in England, exceeds that in Great Britain four years ago.

The London Daily Mail says that news has been received from Kutain, Transcaucasia, that three Russian nobles were executed March 3 for the murder of over one hundred persons.

Another massacre of fourteen native Christians has occurred at Nanyan, province of Honan, China.

The shipbuilding industry of Great Britain has not enjoyed such a lease of prosperity as it is experiencing at present for several years past. The yards of the Clyde, Tyne, and other centers are so full of contracts that work is being maintained at the highest pressure to cope with the orders. Several large liners for the various leading steamship companies of the country are on the stocks, and the new orders are accumulating so rapidly that several new shipyards are to be constructed in various parts of the country to enable the work to be executed expeditiously.

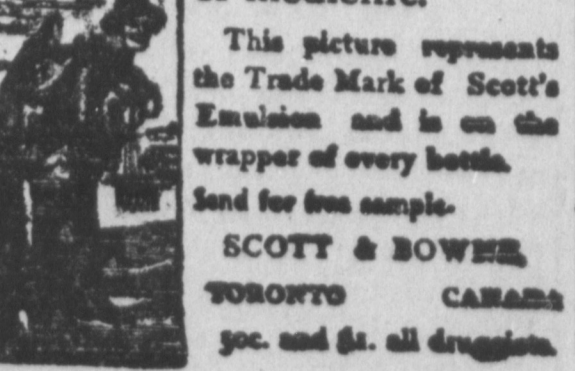
