News of the Week

NEW BRUNSWICK

The Fredericton City Council has decided to hold a plebiscite on the sewerage question on March 10, the day of civic elections.

Edwin Brown who was charged with destroying property at Brown's Flats, was allowed to go on suspended sentence, after Judge Wedderburn had given him a severe reprimand.

The contract for the Marysville, York Co., post office building has been awarded to C. B. Simmons of Gibson, for \$6,787.

At Edmunston, Monday morning of last week there was a distinct shock of earthquake. The trembling lasted a full minute, and articles were knocked down in some houses.

Tuesday of last week, at Cogswell Settlement, near Florenceville Geo. Kilpatrick committed suicide by cutting his throat. The deceased was 34 years of age and unmarried and has lived alone. Despondency over the loss of his burns in Sunday's storm is the supposed cause of his rash act.

During the past year 254 cases of contagious diseases were reported at the Board of Health from the City and County of St. John, nearly twice as many as the year before. The deaths from these cases numbered 47. The small pox outbreak is responsible for nearly the whole increase.

Lewis Hicks, aged 70 years, living about nine miles from Petitcodiac, was

Dickinson's tannery, Woodstock, was damaged by fire Wednesday. Insured.

The U. N. B. gymnasium and most of its contents was destroyed by fire Thursday afternoon.

Early Sunday morning fire broke out in the store of Fickler & Co. this city. Much of the stock of ready made clothing etc. was destroyed by fire or water. Mr. Fickler says his stock-taking just finished showed \$45,000 was of goods in stock, and he estimates his loss at over \$30,000. Probably these figures are rather high estimates. The insurance is \$17,000. The building is damaged to the extent of perhaps \$2,000. It belongs to Alex. Calder, and is not insured.

NOVA SCOTIA

As the result of Sunday's gale thirty vessels are lying in Lunenburg harbor more or less damaged. Nine vessels were ashore around the harbor.

The Mail Special on the I. C. R., which left Halifax about one o'clock Saturday morning for the west, had an accident at Grand Lake embankment. The Sleeper went off the track and turned over on its side. The passengers were badly shaken up, but none were seriously injured.

The Barquentine Peerless, salt laden, from Cape Verde, arrived at Halifax Saturday with most of her crew badly frozen. The vessel was on the coast for eight days, during which she vainly attempted to reach Halifax. Storm and intense cold practically disabled every man of the vessel, and after awful suffering the much reduced company managed to get into harbor.

Messrs. Illsley and Horn, of Toronto, have secured the erection of the new Intercolonial Railway station at Halifax. The contract runs up near to \$100,000.

The Allan-Furness liner Grecian while entering Halifax port about 3 o'clock Sunday morning during a thick snow squall, went ashore at Sandwich Point, near Herring Cove, on the western side of the harbor, and is in a dangerous position. The steamer has about 500 tons of cargo, principally salt, and one passenger.

Within the last three months five illicit stills have been suppressed in Antigonish County.

The Truro Daily News tells of a four and a half feet coal seam discovered at Kempton.

Smallpox is vanishing from Halifax. Vaccination has been general.

The following have been appointed justices of the peace: Samuel S. Scott, Halifax; John A. Gillis, Ship Harbor; George D. Wright, Elmsdale; J. Elliot Smith, Port Williams; J. Dorsey Chute Caledonia, Queens.

Lumbering interests in the Province will be advanced by the recent abundant snow fall. The ground is hard; lakes and streams are well frozen over and winter seems fairly settled down to business.

There are eleven hundred men now working on the Cape Breton Railway between Point Tupper and St. Peters. This number is being supplemented almost every day by Newfoundland labor.

A new electric cancelling machine has been installed at the Toronto post office with a capacity of one thousand stamps a minute.

The Toronto city directory for 1922 just issued, places Toronto's population at 259,420, which is 57,000 more than given by dominion census. It has 94,335 individual names and the population is got by multiplying this by two and three-quarters.

At Lindsay, Ont., Wednesday, J. B. Walker, secretary of the Y. M. C. A. was killed by electricity. He and the Caretaker were making connection on an electric light wire, when he received the full force of the current.

The Deering Harvester Company, of Chicago, is negotiating with Brockville for the establishment of an agricultural implements works there to employ 1,000 men.

UNITED STATES

The loss by the Waterbury, Conn. fire is estimated at \$4,000,000. No loss of life, and few accidents.

The Chicago city council has decided to remove all restrictions on the height of fire proof buildings. This action paves the way for the immediate expenditure of \$20,000,000 for buildings.

Six men were killed and as many more injured in a fire at St. Louis, Mo. The killed and injured were all members of the fire department.

There was a snowstorm in North Texas and heavy rains in Southern Texas last week. The fall of snow was very heavy. The snow will be of great benefit to the wheat crop.

In Chicago, Wednesday, 13 lives were lost, many people slightly injured, two buildings at 372 and 374 Twenty-second street were wrecked, and \$50,000 damage, was done by an explosion of gas.

A great fire swept through Paterson, New Jersey, Sunday, and in its wake are the embers and ashes of property valued at \$11,000,000. It burned its way through the business section of the city destroying a majority of the finer structures devoted to commercial, civic, educational and religious use as well as scores of other houses. Hundreds were left homeless and thousands without employment.

The expedition investigating the site of ancient Babylon has discovered the throne room of the great King Nebuchadnezzar, an enormous place about 66 feet broad and 170 feet long, the entrance being immediately opposite the alcove on which the throne stood. On each side of the throne on the north side of the hall are richly coloured architectural adornments. The expedition has also discovered a large number of inscribed bricks. These have been translated, and are found to be letters, psalms, contracts, for the study of the Old Testament.

In the land of Judea what a change! From Joppa to Jerusalem now runs a steam railway. How different from the journeyings of ages past on this sacred soil. And now a trolley line is being constructed to run south, through the wilderness to Mount Sinai. And men are planning an electric road to run northwardly to Damascus. Hitherto Palestine, with customs identical with Bible times, has been a witness to the Scripture - such a witness that it has been called the "fifth gospel."
