POLITICAL NEWS.—The Conservatives will protest the election of E. J. Pense, elect member for Kingston, Ont., on grounds of corrupt practices. The Lennox, Ont., recount resulted in a tie. The returning officer gave a casting vote and declared Madole (liberal) elected. Of the votes cast in [the] Ontario general election, the opposition candidates received a majority of 7,377 over the government candidates.

THE ANOINTING OIL.—Some weeks ago one of the German papers printed an article of considerable interest concerning the origin of the oil with which the King and Queen will be anointed at the Coronation. The oil has a strange origin. Like the oil with which Clovis, King of the Franks, was anointed, and which was supposed to have been brought from heaven by an angel, so also this English Coronation oil is of 'divine' origin. Mary herself brought it to Thomas A. Becket, Archbishop of Canterbury, when he was an exile in France. The oil was in a golden vessel which had the form of an eagle, the balm or anointment being in a postal box. The saint gave this as a gift to a monk in Poitiers, who hid it under a stone in the Church of St. Gregory. Here it remained until the time of Edward III., where another pious man saw the hiding place in a dream and brought the precious oil to the Black Prince.
