Small wonder then that there were times when for a moment the godly man's faith failed, even though he knew that "the Lord would provide." I was only a boy, not half way with my teens, but it was a long time ago, but there are times now when, in my day dreams, I see that bent form, the care-worn face, lightened at moments by the light of heaven that "never fails," as he said to his soul,

Content or a cottage, why should I care;
I am building a palace for me over there."

and then the shadow drove away in sunshine, for the "palace" seemed away, and the "tent" was old and full.

There was a well worn path between the minister's home and ours, for I was with the minister's boy, or he was with me when we were not in our beds. One morning I went over when the minister had just returned home after some months absence. They were at breakfast when I went in. Of course, after breakfast came family prayer. It chanced that I knelt just behind the minister. I had never seen the soles of a minister's boots before. The heels of the old minister's boots were metal plates (the first I had seen), and I supposed that all ministers wore them. As I gazed at the passage over which I had puzzled my little head was explained. It must be being "shod with the preparation of the gospel," I said.

THE TEACHERS.—The Canadian teachers for South Africa had a very pleasant ten days in London. Their letters tell of receptions and entertainments at which they met many distinguished people and were made to feel that their going to Africa is regarded in England as an important imperial service.

PARLIAMENT

MONDAY.—In reply to Mr. Gourlay, the premier said no negotiations were in progress respecting the union of Canada and Newfoundland.

On motion for supply Mr. Borden opened up a discussion of the future attitude of the premier on the subject of imperial commercial relations. He pointed out that the premier had informed England that Canada did not desire a preference in return for ours. He went on to speak of the grain duties recently imposed by the imperial parliament, and said that the attention of the imperial government should have been called to desire of Canada that our grain should be exempted. The imperial government had taken a step which Canadian ministers had over and over again said could not be taken. Now this country wanted to know what the Canadian government proposed to do, or had done in the matter.

Mr. Borden closed his speech with the statement that if the premier would propose a resolution in favor of an imperial preference tariff the opposition would gladly support this motion and make it unanimous. Sir W. Laurier said that at the imperial conference he would take part in the discussions, but he would discuss them in the tone of his message to Mr. Chamberlain.

Regarding preferential trade, he said he was prepared to advocate such action. He was going to England to discuss commercial relations. No doubt Chamberlain had something to propose. He conceded that the situation today was different from that of 1897. The adoption of food duties by Britain had made a change in the situation. He would go to the conference to listen to what England might propose and then he would advocate mutual tariff preference. He would be glad to confer with Mr. Borden as to the form of resolution which should be favored unanimously by the house.

The house passed Mr. Tarte's estimates for dredging and telephone line.

TUESDAY.—This morning Mr. Borden reviewed the financial operations of the government, pointing out the

increase of taxation and expenditure &c. He moved an amendment setting forth the total increases and expressing the opinion that there is no justification for them.

Mr. Fielding excused the increased expenditure on the ground that it was a growing time.

Mr. Tarte admitted a large increase of expenditure, and hoped it would be continued.

The house went into committee on the vote of \$327,000 to Mackenzie and Mann.

Mr. Borden, and other members asked for an explanation, but Mr. Blair, who made the motion did not speak.

Mr. Monk wanted to know who instructed Mackenzie and Mann to go to work without parliamentary authority.

WEDNESDAY.—Most of the remaining government bills were put through this morning.

The house voted \$50,000 for the sufferers from the recent volcanic eruption in Martinique and St. Vincent. Mr. Fielding said that of the \$50,000 one-half would at once be placed to the credit of the French relief fund for Martinique. The other half might be devoted to the sufferers in St. Vincent or other islands.

Mr. Borden supported the proposition. Concurrence in the estimates was completed.

THURSDAY.—Prorogation took place this afternoon with the usual formalities.

Though the Premier had promised Mr. Borden that he would consult him in the preparation of resolution concerning preferential trade and imperial conference, he did not mention the subject afterwards, and the house prorogued without further action.
