News of the Week

New Brunswick.

Anderson charged with stabbing Paterson at New Denmark, V. Co. has been committed for trial.

A baby, 3 weeks old, was left at the door of the home of Mrs. H. Green on Metcalf St., St. John. It was in a valise and was nicely dressed, and a note accompanying said, "Please take me. I was born Apr. 6th 1902. My name is Edgar Stuart." The child has been adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Taylor Bond. The mother has not yet been found, though it is believed he is known.

Frank Brown was found dead in the stable of the Fire Station, Moncton Monday of last week. The verdict of the Coroner's jury was that he died of his death from excessive drink.

At Shenstone, A. Co. a few days ago Chandler Collins attempted to cross a pond upon a log and fell off and was drowned.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R., is building a summer residence at St. Andrews, N. B. which will cost fifteen thousand dollars.

The upper flat of Wm. Gray's house 560 Main Street, St. John, occupied by Gilford Sweeny, was badly damaged by fire, Tuesday evening.

Alex. Hood has purchased the Hedley Vanwart farm at Queensbury, York Co. and will remove thereto at once.

It is stated that C. P. Baker, of Randolph & Baker, is about to enter suit for \$50,000 damages against the dominion government on the grounds that by the expropriation of land for the lighthouse at Green Head he was deprived of a valuable right of way to his lime kilns in that vicinity.

The reports from the lumber drives grow more satisfactory and are dispelling the fear that there would not be a supply of logs for the mills this season.

The investigation in the Oulton case, in St. John, has continued during the week. There is much mystery attaching to it yet. Today (Monday) the coroner will hear council and then present the case to the jury.

The storehouse, barn and small buildings of B. H. Kerr, merchant of Miltown, St. Stephen, were burned Sunday. The contents of the buildings—wagons, harness, hay, a quantity of flour, sugar, beans and other goods were also burned.

The flour and shingle mill of the Van Baren Lumber Co., Edmunston, was burned to the ground, Saturday. In the grist mill there was a large stock of wheat and flour. The loss will be \$15,000, partly insured. About thirty men were employed about the mill.

Nova Scotia.

A few days ago George Reyno, a fisherman at Herring Cove, was seriously stabbed during a fight. The knife blade pierced his lung.

The men of the builders' labourers union in Halifax have struck for higher wages. The bricklayers could not go on without them, and had to stop work. The plasterers and the stone cutters have, also, gone out for an increase.

The Dominion Atlantic Railway expects to have a new boat out in November for the St. John and Digby route. This boat will be a big freighter that will carry 40 cars of freight quite easily in addition to excellent passenger accommodation. The dredging at Digby is being executed to accommodate the new boat.

A. B. Crosby was elected Mayor of Halifax, Wednesday, by 16 majority over C. S. Laine.

A p'ebiscite was taken at the Halifax elections in connection with the proposed steel shipbuilding industry. The vote was almost unanimous in favor of giving a cash bonus of \$100,000 toward establishment of a shipyard on the shores of Halifax harbor.

\$400,000 are to be expended at Sydney for railway purposes.

Six corpses were brought by a recent boat from Boston for burial in Nova Scotia.

John Matheson, Reserve Mines, C. B. died from injuries received by a fall from a cart and the wheels passing over him.

Fire at Trenton, Pictou, a few days ago destroyed Humphrey's glass factory and barn and a workshop adjoining the factory. The proprietors were just getting in shape for the season.

It is feared that the Schooner Bear River, which sailed from Port George for Port Williams, Saturday, April 26, and has not since been reported, is lost with all hands.

At Halifax, Sunday, the Schooner Jeanie Myrtle arrived from the Banks via La Have, with one of the crew ill with smallpox. The man is very sick.

John Brown, the colored man under arrest at Sydney for shooting Malcolm Ferguson, escaped from the county jail and left a note stating that he was going to the seashore about 60 miles away for air, to stand trial if alive and "to terrify the court if dead."

Off Sandy Cove, in the Bay of Fundy, Thursday, a boat manned by Marvin Morehouse and Egbert Robb bins filled and went to the bottom. John and Herbert Holmes managed to rescue Morehouse, but were too late to save his companion.

The North Sydney Herald building, occupied by the Herald, and by Sidney Salter, lumber merchant, was badly damaged by fire Friday. All the printing materials of the Herald were destroyed. Insured.

Other Provinces.

Large catches of lobsters are being made at Rustico, P. E. I.

The exporting of young pigs from P. E. Island is quite an industry this spring.

More cases of smallpox in Ontario are reported.

Four hundred gas and steam fitters and one hundred and twenty-five roofers of Montreal went on strike Thursday morning.

In Valleyfield, P. Q., and vicinity, there are now 150 smallpox cases. The situation is serious, and there is talk of closing the cotton mills. The authorities have been lax. The cotton Company are now demanding that all their employees be vaccinated.

Go'd has of late been found at Cape Scott on the Northwest of Vancouver Island.

The steamer Walrus, has returned to St. John's, N. F. with 17,000 seals on board.

Five children, their ages ranging from 3 to 12 years, of Monchamp, at St. Norbert, Manitoba, were burned to death. Monchamp, his wife and daughter were also badly burned. The parents made heroic efforts to rescue the other children who slept upstairs but were cut off by the flames.

In Toronto on Thursday, over 1300 workmen stopped work. The trades represented are; Bricklayers, 350; carpenters, 400; machine woodworkers 175; wire, wood and metal lathers, 75; carriage and wagon workers, 175; jewelry workers, 15; printers and pressmen, 8. Total 1,314.

The new Ogilvie Milling Company has decided to build 20 new elevators at various points in western Canada. The aggregate expenditure will be about \$2,600,000.

At Egmont, P. E. I., five boys were poisoned by eating wild parsnips; one died.

United States.

Thursday at Keewane, Ill., the fast mail train ran down a carriage containing four young people, and all were instantly killed.

There is a general lockout of plasterers throughout New York city.

Reports from all parts of New Mexico indicate that sheep are dying by the hundreds. The grass has practically dried up on account of the drought. Added to the losses of the sheepmen in the territory are reports that grasshoppers are already creating havoc in the Northern Rio Grande valley. Around Santa Cruz the insects are eating off clean early vegetables, etc.

An accident to a boy, Isador Baccus, was responsible for the death of eight girls and young women, the fatal injury of three others and the serious injury of more than two score of girls employed in a cigar factory, Philadelphia, on Thursday. The elevator was at the top of the shaft and Baccus pulled the rope to bring it down. He opened the door to the shaft and leaned out to see where the carriage was. The elevator, descending slowly, struck him across the back of the neck, pinning his head between the elevator and the floor. A boy released Baccus and cried for help. Then in the panic that followed the girls were hurt.

The spotted fever scourage has broken out in the Bitter Root Valley, Montana.

A passenger train going at the rate of 65 miles an hour was derailed Saturday near Medill, Mo., resulting in the death of five and injury of twenty-three people.

A tornado swept over Somerville Co., Texas, killing five and injuring forty people Tuesday.

The collision of two trains on the N. Y. Central Friday caused the death of two men, and injured 13 others.

Potter Palmer, one of Chicago's leading business men, died Sunday.

Sunday two men were killed and 45 injured, two probably fatally, in a head-on collision between an emigrant train and a fast freight on the Connelville division of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad.

British and Foreign.

Princess Radziwill was found guilty of forgery at Cape Town Wednesday and sentenced to two years' imprisonment.

The man who assassinated M. Sipiaguine, the Russian minister of the interior, April 15, has been sentenced to death.

A Calcutta, despatch, Thursday, says, a tornado has devastated the city of Dacca and adjoining towns. Four hundred and sixteen persons were killed. Crops were ruined throughout the district. Dacca, a city in Bengal, is 150 miles northeast of Calcutta.

The Gurnigelbad, a famous health resort in Switzerland was destroyed by fire Wednesday night. The church alone escaped.

Cholera is still raging in the Philippines.

Six elephants, six tigers, six leopards six antelopes, 500 monkeys, a large number of snakes and small birds form part of the cargo of the steamer Silesia, which has left Singapore for New York via Hamburg.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs that heavy beneficial rains have fallen in Bengal and Assam, and that there have been local showers in Burma and parts of Madras.

The fourth monthly instalment of the Chinese war indemnity, amounting to 1,820,000 taels (\$1,292,200) was paid Wednesday. The total of the Chinese indemnity is 450,000,000 taels (\$319,500,000.)

The Russian government has decided to rebuild the fortifications on the German and Austrian frontiers at a cost of 420,000,000 roubles, about \$210,000,000. This action is necessary as the result of Col. Grimm's betrayal of the plans of the existing Russian fortresses.

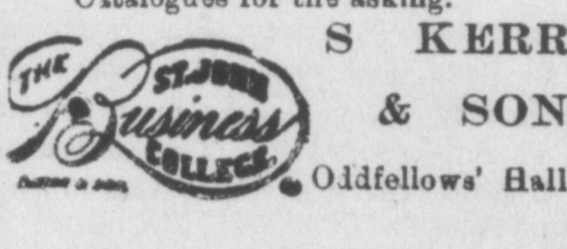

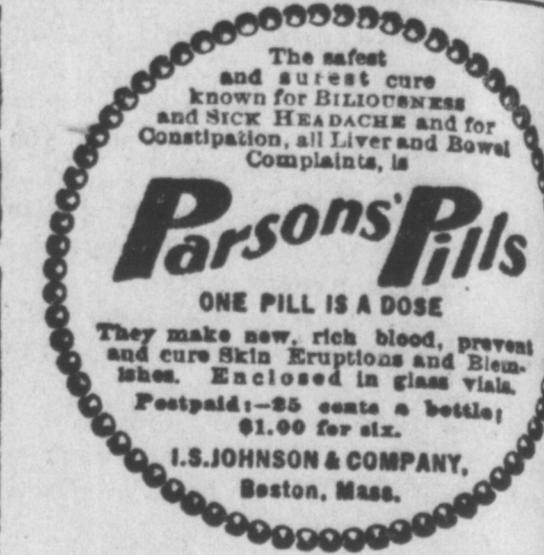

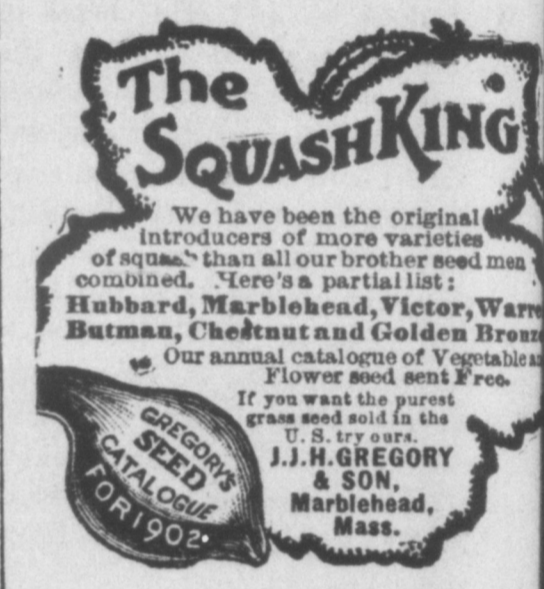
