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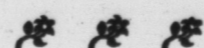

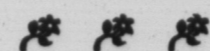

WATERWAYS.—That the value of waterways is fully understood in Europe is evident from the fact that France has expended \$90,000,000 on such works during the years 1879-1900, and has increased the total length of her waterways from 906 to 2,930 miles, including 401 miles of newly-constructed canals. Austria between the years 1848-1868 spent \$105,000,000 on waterways. The greatest advance of all has been made by Germany. In 1882 the number of steamers on her waterways was but 830, representing 33,155 tons. By 1897 the number of steam-propelled vessels had risen to 1,953, with a total tonnage of 104,360 tons. The length of the waterways of Germany in 1900, according to imperial statistics, was 8,798 miles. The total length of British waterways in 1896, exclusive of ship canals, was 3,511 miles.
