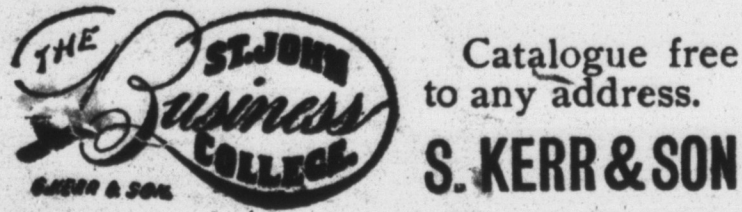


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DEDICATION.

THE CONFERENCE.

were appointed a committee to meet the committee appointed by the Baptist Convention.

The Conference then proceeded to the election of the Executive of Conference, which resulted in the choice of Revs. J. McLeod, D.D., C. T. Phillips, B. H. Nobles, F. Clarke Hartley and D. Long.

A communication from the B. and F. Bible Society was read by Mr. W. Peters, and a resolution was adopted, that all the churches take up a special collection on Bible Society Sunday, March 6th, 1904.

The report on temperance was then taken from the table, and the adoption of it was moved by Rev. R. W. Ferguson, who made an earnest address on the subject. It was seconded by Rev. J. Perry, who spoke of his hatred for the liquor traffic and, also about the first pledge he knew of. It was also ably supported by Rev. G. Swim, who emphasized the need of voting for temperance men for all representative positions. Rev. C. T. Phillips spoke of the advantages of having the traffic delegalized,

even though the law may be much violated. Rev. D. Long and Rev. A. J. Prosser also spoke earnest words.

The Conference then adjourned, with prayer by Rev. Dr. McLeod.

PEAT.—According to the Glasgow Herald a scheme for the erection of works for the utilization of peat at Mid-Locharwoods has been formulated by the Scottish Peat Industries, Limited. Already there are similar works in operation at Racks, Dumfries, which turn out solid dry blocks as fuel, almost as dense as coal, which ignite easily, and burn slowly with little ash. In Germany the industry has been developed to a considerable extent. There, steel is manufactured by means of peat charcoal, and at least twenty-seven glass factories use peat fuel. In Bavaria, peat is largely used in locomotives, and in Russia, Sweden and Holland it is similarly applied, and also for moss litter. The Belfast Witness thinks it would be "good news for Ireland, and the Highland laird and the Highland cotter alike, if our thousands of acres of peat land could be utilized as to supply fuel to our towns and villages." These facts should be of some interest to those who are endeavoring to develop a peat industry in Canada.

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
