

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

HOME HINTS.

Steamed Eggs.—Break the eggs into a buttered dish, set inside a steamer over a kettle of boiling water and steam until the whites are thoroughly cooked and firm; season with butter, pepper and salt.

Pineapple Pie.—Chop one-half pint of pineapple; beat to a cream one cupful powdered sugar and one-half cupful of butter, and add the yolk of two eggs, well beaten to a stiff froth and mix very lightly; turn into pie plate and bake with under-crust only.

Cheese Balls.—Cupful of grated cheese, half a cupful of fine bread crumbs, five drops of Worcestershire sauce and one egg, well beaten; mix together, roll into balls and place in a wire frying basket, and, just before time to serve, plunge the basket into boiling fat and allow them to remain until a delicate brown.




