THE BAPTIST WOMEN.

The Women's Baptist Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces held its annual meeting in the Baptist church at Woodstock last week. This convention represents the Woman's Missionary work in 400 Baptist churches, whose total membership is more than 50,000.

Reports showed that \$11,179.46 had been contributed during the year, an increase over the preceding year.

A revision of the foreign work done by the union showed an advance. There are seven stations, eight churches, Sunday-schools, evangelical schools, day schools and boarding schools, one hospital, one reading room, six lady missionaries and forty-one baptisms.

WOODSTOCK, N. B. SOCIETY.

Though there is nothing new to write about in our society, yet we thought that the other societies would like to hear from us.

We meet once a month at one of the sister's homes. We have singing, scripture reading and prayer—especially prayer, for we are learning more and more that prayer is the keynote of all successful Christian work. Then some time is devoted to business connected with the society. A collection is always taken at these meetings, and the money raised redeems the pledge of our society for the support of native student in India.

The Wednesday night following our meeting, instead of the regular church prayer meeting, is a missionary meeting, and is led by one of the sisters. At this meeting, too, a silver collection is taken, one-half of which goes to home and one-half to foreign missions.

There is a deep missionary spirit among many of the women, and more have been interested and helped since we have Mrs. Sunder, our former missionary, with us. She is always ready to do anything in her power to make the meetings interesting, and to help along the cause. We are glad to note this increased interest by increased giving. This year the amount given by our society for foreign missions was larger than ever before. Yet the best of us are but luke-warm. The motto of the student volunteer movement would be a good one for us all to remember and take to heart: "The evangelization of the world in this generation." The dead have passed forever beyond our reach. Those who come after us will care for the unborn of the non-Christian world. Our duty lies in the present. Millions of souls for whom Christ died are perishing every year without having even heard of Christ. Shall we consent to this any longer? Let us be more faithful in prayer; "more things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of." Let us be more faithful in giving; let us acknowledge Him in all our ways. Then may we be sure that if we faint not, we shall reap abundant harvests.
