#### TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS.

The following is for the information of those who will attend the Conference at Millstream, K. Co.:

C. P. R.—Purchase ticket to Apohaqui Station, and obtain from the issuing agent a receipt, on standard certificate form, for the ticket purchased. At the Conference have the ticket signed by the secretary, who will announce whether the return ticket will cost one-third or one-half fare, or be free.

I. C. R.—Purchase ticket to Apohaqui, get a standard certificate from the ticket agent; have the certificate signed by the Conference secretary, and a free return ticket will be issued at the station.

Star Line Steamers.—Passengers by Star Line steamers, purchasing tickets one way, will be returned free by having their tickets countersigned by the secretary of Conference.
