ABSTINENCE FROM EVIL.

1 PETER 4: 1-11.

A TEMPERANCE LESSON.

GOLDEN TEXT.—Be not drunk with 18, 19, 24, 25; 2: 7, 11, 17, 24; 3: 10-12; wine, wherein is excess.—Eph. 5: 18.

LEARN BY HEART.—I Pet. 1: 4, 5, 16, 4: 12, 13, 18; 5: 7, 8.

THE NOBLE AND BLESSED LIFE IN JESUS CHRIST.—Vs. 1, 2. Farasmuch then. Referring back to 1 Peter 3: 18. As Christ hath suffered . . . in the flesh. Since he has thus opened the way of salvation and has set the example of doing right at any cost. Arm yourselves. With the same mind. The same spirit and purpose which led Christ to die for the sins of men; viz., the hatred of sin and the love of righteousness. He hath suffered in the flesh. He has suffered in crucifying every evil passion of human nature. Hath ceased from sin. Just as Christ after he had suffered death rose into life immortal. No longer . . . in the flesh to the lusts of men. The sinful desires of human nature. But to the will of God, which is that he should be holy.

THE SINFUL LIFE TO BE REPUDIATED AND FORSAKEN.-Vs. 3, 4. The time past of our life may suffice us. We have had abundant experience of the evil life; we have felt its scorpion stings. It is high time to make a change. Have wrought the will of the Gentiles, the idolaters. The description of their sins in this verse and in the first chapter of Romans is borne out by writers of that age. Lasciviousness, shameless licentiousness and vice. Lusts. The innner principles of licentiousness. Excess of wine. Insatiate desire for strong drink. Revellings. Dancing, and all kinds of frolics. Banquetings. Carousals. Abominable idolatries. The lusts and abominations which were connected with idolatry.

TEMPERANCE APPLICATION. — Strong drink leads to all these vices. It weakens the will, obscures the intellect, dulls the conscience, and inflames the passions. It is the mother of crimes.

THE FORCES BY WHICH THE NEW LIFE CAN OVERCOME THE EVIL LIFE.—Vs. 5-11.

I. THE DAY OF JUDGMENT. Who shall give account. No one can sin with impunity. A judgment day hangs evermore over the head of every sinner. The quick are the living. This judgment came upon the world in Noah's time. It came upon the Jewish nation in two or three years after this Epistle was written. There is still a judgment to come (Mat. 25.)

the Gospel preached. The good news of Saviour, of forgiveness of a holy heaven. To them that are dead. Past generations. That they might be judged according to men. Punished, chastened, as other men. And the purpose of all this was that they might live according to God in the spirit. It was not to destroy them, but to save them to a high, spiritual life. The gospel is the hope and the power by which we may gain the victory over sinful appetite.

3. The Nearness of the Kingdom of God. The end of all things is at hand. The times in which the disciples

lived were to them the 'last times.' They looked for the coming of the Lord as not far off. Nor were the early Christians mistaken in their expectation. They did not understand how the kingdom was come, or what was meant by the end, or what the new kingdom would be. But they did believe in the fact. The end of all that they had known and lived in, the end of one great dispensation, was indeed nigh at hand. The older order was changing and giving place to the new. To them personally, the end of all things in the midst of which they were living and working was not far off, and the opportunity would soon pass away. All this was a powerful motive for turning away from sin. It was now or never.

4. Self-control. Be ye therefore sober, of sound mind, of wise judgment, be temperate.

5. WATCHFULNESS. And watch. Not the usual word for "watch," but be temperate, circumspect, especially referring to abstinence from wine and strong drink.

6. PRAYER. Taking hold of the power of God. No one is strong enough to gain the victory without the help of God. Especially do we need to pray for wisdom to guide all our efforts and plans.

7. Love. Have fervent. The word implies "intense strain." Charity, Move. For charity shall cover the multitude of sins. Slay them, and bury them. It covers our own sins. God's love forgives and blots them out. Love covers the sins of others. It forgives them. It punishes when needful, that it may save from sin.

8. Hospitality. Use hospitality.... without grudging or murmuring. Every home should be the center of Christian hospitality. As every man hath rectived the gift. Whatever we have received from God we are to use it in ministring to others. For we are only stewards of the manifold grace of God. Manifold is God's grace to us, and manifold should be the use of his gifts to us for others.

9. Doing all for Christ's Sake. If any man speak as the oracles of God, in accordance with God's revealed will. If any man minister. Serve others. That God . . . may be glorified by the manifestation of his love and power in the disciples of Jesus Christ.
