themselves in the very best interests of the cause entrusted to us.

In the First District Rev. L. A. Fenwick, in addition to his regular pastorate, gave much care to the Tobique section, for which we are under much obligation, especially as he has declined remuneration.

Early in the summer months Licentiate T. D. Bell offered himself to your board. He was sent to the First District under the direction of the Rev. L. A. Fenwick. Their labors have been much blessed. There has been almost continual revival. Bro. Bell is absent from this session because of the demands in special work. Fifty dollars has been granted to the field. We would express our thanks to God for sending us Bro. Bell. Licentiate H. M. Manzer has also given care to churches in this District. A grant of \$10 was made to him.

In the Second District the Victoria Corner and Hartland pastorates have not had regular care, but Revs. G. W. Foster, H. Hartt, T. S. Vanwart and A. W. Currie have given them services at as regular intervals as possible. There have been no demands upon the board.

In the Third District Rev. J. J. Barnes has cared for the Southampton pastorate, and received \$50 as a supplement to his salary.

In the Fourth District Licentiate Puddington received \$25 for service rendered to the Gagetown pastorate.

Licentiate J. C. Wilson, at the end of the college year, was sent to White Head, where he remained for two months. We were required to supplement his salary to the extent of \$17.00. At the end of two months it was deemed expedient to recall Bro. Wilson. He was then sent to Deer Island, where he remained, rendering accepted service until the beginning of the college year. No supplement was required.

Bro. J. G. Perry was sent to Beaver Harbor for the summer. His services were well received, but it was found necessary to supplement to the amount of \$20. Licentiate Bonnell has been laboring for several months in the Fifth District. A grant of \$10 was made to him.

Rev. J. Noble has given much care and labor to the field at large. Of his services we need not speak, their character is well known. We have granted him the sum of \$30.00.

The work of the year has been in no small degree like unto making bricks without straw. We have had no time less than ten pastorates, for which we could not find pastors. To the call for help, we have had to answer again and again, "We have no one to send." Never was there a time when there were more doors open to us and greater opportunities for service than now. We need more pastors, and would recommend that a season of prayer be had that God may add unto us many more laborers.

There are demands made upon the board that should not be. Pastorless churches, which should be self-sustaining, call for help. We are not prepared to say with whom the blame for such facts rest; but we would urge that no pastor ask for help from the board until every effort has failed to raise the required amount. And then that the pastor insist upon the brethren of the pastorate making the application. We would urge that more attention be given to the home mission collection by the

churches. God will yet give us men, and we would, just now, show our faith in him by placing in the treasury means to send out these men when they shall be given us.

Your board enters upon a new year, trusting that we shall have the increased support of all the brethren, and assuring you that the interests committed to us will have our prayerful attention.
