A new and attractive cover brightens the appearance of The Missionary Review of the World for July, nor are the contents less pleasing. "The Past and Present in the Philippines is very forcibly contrasted. The editor-in-chief calls for "A New Missionary Crusade," which will appeal forcefully to all interested in missionary progress. There are timely articles on Japan and "The Russian Missionary in Japan." One of the most important contributions to this issue is the story of the Central Presbyterian Church of New York and its missionary work—"A Church That Supports Two Stations" and a dozen missionaries.
