RIGHT HAND OR LEFT

According to Dr. Flint, the normal man is right-handed, only four out of one hundred persons being left-handed, and two ambidextrous. "Of a hundred criminals, nineteen was left-handed, these including assassins, incendiaries, and burglars. Highwaymen, however, presented the normal proportion. ating from a man of such distinction, must be accepted, it would seem to follow that left-handedness is an indication of some abnormal affection of the brain; and so, indeed, it seems to be. "The normal man is not only right-handed, but he uses the right leg and the right eye in preference to the left." But this means that he uses the left half of the brain more than the right. Why the greater use of the left side of the brain should be more normal than that of the right is not apparent. Yet it seems to be a fact; and it seems also to be a fact that the contrary is a heavy disadvantage. The whole subject is exceedingly obscure; but there can be no doubt that left-handedness in children should be watched and counteracted to the utmost possible degree.—Scientific American.
