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HINTS TO THE HOUSEWIFE.

A lamp-wick will give a brighter, stronger flame if the end in the oil is frayed out for an inch.

One who has tried it says scraped raw potato will relieve ear sickness. It is also a satisfactory remedy for burns.

When rugs show a decided tendency to curl at the corners, sew an L-shaped piece of buckram on the under side.

Unused table linens should be washed at least once a year, thoroughly dried and refolded, to prevent yellowing and rotting where the folds are.

If tincture of iodine is instantly applied where carbolic acid has touched the flesh, no blister will result. The iodine should be applied with a feather.

Plainly-colored toilet soaps are apt to be the purest, and, like laundry soap, it is advantageous to buy in quantity, to make sure that it is absolutely cured before using.

The galvanized iron tubs can be cleaned by scrubbing with hot vinegar and soda, allowing the mixture to remain on for a time, then wash in hot, strong soapsuds, and wipe dry.

A complexion that is very oily is usually brought about by an incorrect diet. Every man or woman who would be healthy should avoid all highly spiced, stimulating foods, and very greasy viands; also pastries of unusual richness. If you will drink plenty of water, and in that way keep the kidneys in a healthy condition, you will find an improvement in your complexion.

To clean the ivory handles of knives, mix ammonia and olive oil in equal parts and add enough prepared chalk to make a paste. Rub the ivory with this, and let it dry before brushing off. Several applications may be necessary.

To clean mother of pearl wash with whitening and cold water.

An excellent broth for an invalid is made by taking a pound of mutton, a pound of beef and half a chicken and putting into a large pot with 3 quarts of water. Boil for half an hour, then let the mixture simmer until the broth has been reduced to three pints.

Macaroni Salad.—Chop cold boiled macaroni in rather small pieces and mix it with chopped white cabbage. The macaroni should not have been dressed with cheese or tomato sauce. Toss in a mayonnaise and serve on lettuce leaves. This tastes very much like sweet-breads.

Oatmeal Muffins.—Sift together one cup of oatmeal, one and one-half pints of flour, one teaspoonful of salt, and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Rub into this mixture one tablespoonful of butter, then add two well-beaten eggs and a pint of milk. Mix smoothly into a batter, fill muffin pans two-thirds full, and bake in a hot oven for fifteen minutes, and you have delicious oatmeal muffins.

Cabbage.—An excellent cabbage dish consists of a small cabbage boiled the day before it is to be used, then chop it into small pieces, add salt and pepper and a tablespoonful of melted butter. When this has been stirred in, put over the fire with half a supful of milk or cream; when hot stir in two well-beaten eggs and immediately turn into a hot buttered frying pan. Stir with a fork until brown, serve in a hot dish with minced parsley.

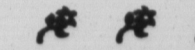


HOW WHALES OBTAIN FOOD.

There are several varieties of whales, but the sperm whale, though the smallest, is the most valuable.—*Selected.*

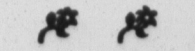


ONLY A BOTTLE OF INK.
