the head. This not only strains the muscles of the arms, but those of the chest and shoulders as well, and the deep, regular breathing which should accompany sound and restful sleep is then difficult of accomplishment.

Don't lie on the chest or stomach with the hands supporting the face, and the face itself pressed into the pillow. Just as surely as you follow this pernicious practice just so surely will you cultivate round shoulders, a hollow chest, and shallow breathing. Those exasperating little hollows which appear around the neck and shoulders are often distinctly traceable to this bad habit, and in addition the head acquires a forward droop and a hang which is far from being becoming.

Don't ever, under any circumstances, sleep with the head covered up in the bedclothes. For healthful sleep a constant circulation of pure air is necessary; and with the head all covered up under the clothes the lungs are forced to breathe the same air time after time until they become poisoned with their own exhalations. Oxygen is necessary to the maintenance of life; and in breathing the oxygen which is inhaled into the lungs is exhaled as carbonic acid gas, a poison which in sufficient quantity has been known to kill.

Above all, don't sleep in any part of the clothing worn during the day. The practice is disgustingly unclean and makes for ill health.

MOLASSES CANDY.

A good recipe for molasses candy is given below:

Take three cups of graunlated sugar and place in a large sancepan, pour on a quarter of a cup of water, and allow to slowly dissolve over the fire. After it has boiled for several minutes, pour in a cup of molasses, very slowly, stirring meanwhile; allow to boil again, and add a half-cup of molasses. Stir occasionally, so that the syrup does not stick or burn. Then add a teaspoonful of cider vinegar, poured in slowly. This stirs up considerable commotion, and should be thoroughly stirred so that it mixes with the syrup.

Boil for a while and test in the usual way, by dipping a little of the mixture in a cup of cold water; just before removing, and a little vanilla, stir, and pour on buttered pans.

When nuts are used, they are placed on the pans, and the hot mixture is poured over. Quick stirring must be done to mix thoroughly together. Peanuts crushed to powder, combined with plain molasses candy, are delicious. Before the candy hardens in the pans, butter the sides of a knife and mark off into square blocks.

Nuts, small pieces of figs, slices of lemon-peel, and a lettle tea berries make a rather unusual-looking sweet meat, which, in reality, is nothing more than molasses candy poured over these ingredients.

東東 A CHILD'S HEROISM.

Here is a noble instance of a child's heroism in real life. It is a peculiarly cool and gallant act on the part of a little girl named Edith Miles, aged ten, of Rearsby, in Leicestershire, to which the attention of the Royal Humane Society has just been drawn. Several children were playing on the banks of the village brook, which was swollen by the heavy rains, and ran at an abnormally swift speed when one of the number, a little boy aged five, fell into the water and was carried rapidly down the stream. Edith Miles did not jump into the water, as she recognized even

in this moment of excitement that she would be too weak to battle against the stream and effect a rescue. So she ran as fast as she could along the bank until she came to a plank bridge at a place called Goglane, about sixty yards away. Lying down at full length, she put both her arms out, and waited patiently for the boy, who had already sunk twice. When the stream had carried him to within an arm's length of the plank, the girl caught hold of him firmly by the collar, and pulled him out of the water.—Christian Life.




