LESSON I.—Jan. 1.

CHRIST THE LIFE AND LIGHT  
OF MEN.

JOHN I: 1-8.

Commit Vs. 1-4. Read John 8: 12-30.

GOLDEN TEXT.—*In him was life; and the life was the light of men.*—John 1: 4.

Learn by heart Vs. 1, 14, and 18.

HISTORICAL SETTING.—*Time.*—In the beginning.

The Word was made flesh the last of B. C. 5, four years before our A. D. begins.

John's witness to Jesus A. D. 26, 27. Jesus entered upon his ministry early in A. D. 27.

For John, the apostle, and his gospel, see page 7.

In these verses are three great propositions: briefly stated in Vs. 1, 14 and 18.

First. *The Divine Nature of the Son of God our Saviour.*—Vs. 1-5.

In the beginning. Before the world was made. *The Word.* The Greek "Logos" means "not only the spoken word," but "the will of God manifested in personal action." Hence here it refers to "the Son of God existing from all eternity, and manifested in the person of Jesus Christ." The Word "denotes the personal revealer of God." *The Word was with God.* A living union and communion. *The Word was God.* There is only one God.

In unfolding this proposition we note HE WAS THE CREATOR.—Vs. 2, 3. *The same was in the beginning.* The relation was not new with the coming of Christ. God was never without his Son. *All things were made by him.* Creation was his work. "All things" include things spiritual as well as material. *And without him.* Apart from him. *Made.* All creation was a revelation of God and of his Son.

HE IS THE SOURCE OF LIFE.—V. 4. *In him was life.* Only life can produce life. The Son of God also in the moral world is giver of spiritual life, eternal life.

HE WAS THE SOURCE OF LIGHT.—*And the life was the light of men.* There is first life, then light. The very first thing that makes light a reality to any being is life. Now, what light does for the natural world Jesus does for the world of man. He reveals God and heaven and truth; he shows the way. *And the light shineth in darkness.* Sin is both death and darkness. As life destroys death, so light destroys darkness. *And the darkness comprehended (R. V., "apprehended") it not.* Did not admit or receive the light so that the darkness would be removed.

Second. *The Son of God became Man in the person of Jesus Christ.*—Vs. 6-17.

THE WITNESS SENT TO ANNOUNCE HIS ADVENT ON EARTH.—Vs. 6, 8. *There was (appeared) a man sent from God.* How he came and was sent is described in Luke and Matthew. He was foretold in Mal. 3: 1; 4: 5. *Came for a witness.* The word witness occurs forty-seven times in the gospel. *That all men through him might believe.* This was his purpose. *He was not the light.* Said lest some should mistake his message to be the gospel of the Messiah.

HOW THE TRUE LIGHT COULD BE KNOWN.—V. 9. *That was the true Light.* The real light, the light of the world. *Which lighteth every man.* The test of the true religion is that it is adapted to all needs.

HOW THE TRUE LIGHT WAS RECEIVED.—Vs. 10-13. *He was in the world.* In all the past ages, in every manifestation of God. *And the world was made by him.* All they possessed or enjoyed was his gift. *And (yet) the world (the great body of men) knew him not.* Did not recognize him as their Saviour and King. *He came unto his own.* Those in whom he had a special ownership, the Jews. *And (even) his own received him not.* The nation, as a whole, did not receive him as their promised Messiah. *Gave he power.* The right and the power. *To become the sons of God.* Heirs of his character, his training, his blessedness. *Even to them that believe on his name.* Men become children of God by believing in his Son. *Which were born.* Receiving the divine spiritual life from God. *Not of blood.* This life is not received by natural inheritance from parents. *Nor of the will of the flesh.* Not by their own efforts. *But of God.* God himself imparts the spiritual life.

AND THE WORD WAS MADE FLESH.—(14). The phrase means more than that he assumed a human body. He assumed human nature entire, having a human body, a human soul, a human spirit. His divine nature was not laid aside.

AND DWELT AMONG US.—Lived among men, lived the human life. *And we.* John, the disciples, and the people. *His glory.* They saw his character in deeds and teachings. *Glory as of the only begotten of the Father.* Glory worthy of the eternal Son, who was the express image of the Father.

FULL OF GRACE AND TRUTH.—Able to bestow them without measure. (15) *John bare witness.* By pointing him out to the people. *Cometh after me.* Jesus entered upon his mission several months later than John. *Is preferred (is become) before me.* Superior to me in character, in work. *And of, as the source.* *Have all we received.* John, and all the Christians. *And grace for grace.* Grace added to grace. *For the law.* The dispensation of law was given by, by means of. *But grace and truth.*

Third. *Jesus the Incarnate Son of God is the Revealer of the Father.*—V. 18.

The whole gospel that follows is the comment and illustration and proof of this proposition. Jesus, the child of Nazareth, is the eternal Christ, the divine presence in the world, the expression of the relationship between man and God, and the embodiment of the purpose of God, and his unending interest in man.

THE HEART OF THE LESSON.

Only a Saviour who is both divine and human can be the Saviour we need.

He reveals to us the personality of God.

Such a Saviour, by attracting us to himself, always attracts us to God. The more we love Jesus, the more we love God.

The Son of God reveals to us the Fatherhood of God, and makes us acquainted with his Fatherly feelings.

Only such a Saviour can make atonement for the sins of men.

Only such a Saviour can help each one of us in all needs.

He only can present every possible motive for the holy life.

The Christian is not a reservoir, but a channel through which the living waters flow to bless mankind. Out of his inner life, said Jesus, shall "flow rivers of living water." Life is never so beautiful as when it is giving itself out the most lavishly in acts of self-sacrificing love. A selfish Christian is an anomaly, if not a monstrosity.—*Brethren Evangelist.*
