General Religious News.

—The Canadian branch of the Salvation Army will send about two hundred delegates to the great International Congress in London that meets next month.
—During last year the British Church Army helped in one way or another more than 70,000 cases of distress, supplying 298,494 days' work and furnishing 1,800,319 meals.
—There are 748 delegates in the General Conference meeting at Los Angeles, Cal. Of these, twenty-five are women; eighty-two represent the colored Conferences, but three of the eighty-two are white men; forty-two are from the foreign field. One hundred and eighty of the delegates were in the last General Conference.
—The small acquaintance of the Roman Catholics of Belgium with the New Testament was lately shown when a professor in the University of Brussels in a course of extension lectures on the Origins of Christianity asked those of the audience who had read St. Paul's Epistles to raise the right hand. Three hands were raised in an audience of 500 of the most cultured men and women of the capital.
—An exchange says that in Austria the Bible is sold in twenty distinct tongues, in Russia in fifty, and in Africa in eighty-one. Financially the cost of issuing the Bible in some instances has been very heavy. Dr. Morrison's translation of the Chinese Bible represented an expenditure of \$50,000; Carey's Serampore versions \$150,000; and the Malagasi revision an outlay of \$15,000.
—An exchange tells us of a certain Methodist Sunday school that has taken as its motto, "Every member for Christ" and has almost realized it, having had 200 conversions during the year. On Easter Sunday this school gave a special offering for missions of over \$500. Spiritual fervor and liberality for missions nearly always go together. Many of the Methodist Sunday schools across the line made Easter Sunday special missionary day. The idea is an excellent one.

THE WAY TO WIN HEART.

The way to win hearts is to show kind attentions and utter kind sentiments. "You have called me brother!" cried the Russian beggar radiantly, who had just begged of Tolstoi without receiving anything. "I am sorry, my brother," said Tolstoi, "but I do not have a single copeck about me." "You have given me more than I asked for," was the joyous answer. "I asked for a few coins, and you have called me brother."—Pilgrim Teacher.

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
