A thousand congregations of Lutherans in the United States and Canada have sent the following cablegram to King Edward:

During the Passion season a thousand congregations of various nationalities have, without Finnish influence, offered intercessions for Finland. We pray Your Majesty to communicate this fact to the Czar and to ask him to deal graciously with Finland.

Hon. W. B. Vail, who was Minister of Militia in the McKenzie government, died in London a few days ago.

We hear that Sanford, the leader of the Shilohites, so-called, has predicted that Grand Manan will sink in June. Two of his followers on the island have gone to Shiloh to be safe.

A convention of Ontario prohibitionists is to be held in Toronto Thursday, to consider the present situation.

Whether it is Mormonism in Utah, or holiness views on Beals Island, Maine, or the blasphemous "Holy Ghost and Us" society, or whatever name it may be called, if it needlessly brings suffering and death to little children or any others, it is not a religion in any sense which calls for the application of the principles of religious liberty.—The Watchman.

POOR POLICY.

A penny-wise policy is never more foolish than when applied to the support of the minister. If it is worth while to have a minister at all it is worth while to support him in such a way that he shall be able to do his best for the church and the community. A man whose sa-

ary is so meagre and so irregularly paid that he cannot keep out of debt and has to be worried continually with the problem of making both ends meet in his finances, cannot possibly do his best. Many churches, we are convinced, make a great mistake in this matter. A comparatively small increase in each individual contribution would amount in the aggregate to an enlargement of the salary which would mean all the difference in the world to the minister. We are convinced that many churches and communities are suffering not only spiritually and morally, but also in their financial interests because they are not devising liberal things in reference to the support of the gospel. A community can make no better investment of money, even in the financial sense, than to get the best minister it can and to treat him so generously and sympathetically that he will be inspired to do his very best for his people.—Messenger and Visitor.

LIFE-SAVING GLOBES.

The life-saving globes invented by Captain Doenvig—which had a preliminary trial some time ago in the English Channel, between Dover and the South Foreland, when one of the globes rode the seas like a cork and was remarkably steady—were successfully tried during a storm recently on the dangerous North Jutland coast. After a trial had first been made with a ballasted buoy, Captain Doenvig, with four other persons, entered a buoy which was launched from the cruiser "Haimdale." The globe successfully cleared the breakers and shoals, and drifted safely ashore. The Doenvig globes are made of steel plates and are surrounded by cork fenders. They have flat double bottoms containing tanks that can be filled with fresh water and used as ballast. There are also compartments for stores. One such sphere can comfortably hold sixteen persons.
