PARLIAMENT.

Wednesday.—Parliament resumed business after several days vacation. An amendment restricting the employment of engineers, etc., on the location surveys of the G. T. P. R., to Canadians and other British subjects, was discussed, and voted down. Mr. Law, Yarmouth, introduced a bill to amend the Scott Act so that magistrates should have the right to impose sentences with or without hard labor.

Thursday.—The G. T. P. discussion continued. Mr. Borden moved the fol-

lowing amendment:

"That the bill be not now read a third time but that it be resolved: That the bill proposes to ratify and confirm agreements imposing upon the country enormous obligations for the construction of a transcontinental railway, a large portion of which is to become the property of a railway corporation to whom the remaining portion is to be leased for fifty years on terms onerous to the country.

"That the obligations undertaken by the country under the proposed agreements will provide almost wholly for the cost of constructing the proposed railway, while the obligation assumed by the Grand Trunk railway company is com-

paratively small.

"The house is of opinion that instead of ratifying the proposed agreements it would be more in the public interests that the dominion should assume the whole obligation necessary for extending across the continent the present government system of railway, thereby completing a transcontinental railway from the Atlantic to the Pacific owned by and under the control of the people

In the course of his speech Mr. Borden declared that in the event of the Liberal Conservative party to power the construction and control of the transcontinental line would be taken out of the hands of the alien corporation to which it had been surrendered by Laurier and would be conducted by Canada on her own behalf.

Mr. Emmerson spoke in advocacy of the bill. The discussion continued till 5.30 a. m. Friday, when the vote was taken on the third reading, and the bill passed by a majority of 46.

Friday.—The all-night session did not fit the members for the next work. They spent Friday afternoon on some agricultural department items, and then adjourned till Monday.
