

F. CLARKE HARTLEY.

Monday.—The Minister of Railways stated that a pension scheme for I. C. R. employes would be introduced next session.

The militia bill was discussed and

many sections passed.

Tuesday.—The consideration of the militia bill was continued. The Canada Eastern Railway purchase was dis-

Wednesday.—Mr. Bell moved the fol-

lowing:

"That while the total taxes collected for the year ending June 30, 1897, were \$28,648,626, or \$5.57 per head of population, notwithstanding the pledges of the Liberal party, the total taxes collected for the year ending June 30, 1903, were \$49,015,545, or \$8.87 per head, and further, that the total taxation for the year ending June 30, 1904-5, were \$53,396,620, or \$9.57 per head.

"That the government maintains the expenditure of the country at a figure out of proportion to the increased population, so that the total expenditure for the year ending June 30, 1904, as stated in the budget speech, has reached the sum of \$66,000,000, exceeding the expenditure for the year 1897 by \$23,027,-

"That the total estimates for the year ending June 30, 1904, are \$77,774,609.

"This house regrets that, notwithstanding the pledges of the Liberal party in opposition to reduce the taxation and expenditure, the government is maintaining a policy of high and steady increasing taxation and expenditure, and is thus setting an example of wasteful and extravagant management of a character which must work serious injury to the people and interests of the country."

The Finance Minister, discussing the resolution, said it was merely a repetition of the annual offering of the opposition. The resolution was lost by a vote of 90 to 48.

The house then went into supply on supplementary estimates. The Premier announced that it was desired to prorogue Saturday, and withdrew several government bills.

Thursday.—A farewell address to the Governor-general, whose term of office expires soon, was adopted on motion of the Premier, seconded by Mr. Borden. Amendments to the Election Act were passed. An anti-tobacco combine bill was passed.

Friday.— The Canada Eastern bill passed without discussion. The alien labor bill was discussed.
