The leader who does it all is a failure. It is not to be a talking meeting, but a prayer-meeting. Talk to God in prayer. The great secret of church work is to get everybody to work. People want to work, they are not satisfied unless they have something to do, and the successful leader will give every one something to do, and help him to do it.

It is a greater work to lead a prayer-meeting successfully than it is to preach a big sermon. For people will admire and forget the sermon, but if they will get close to God in personal work, they will have more than they get out of the preacher's work, no matter how well he does it. I believe that a church which studies the Bible and has a lively prayer-meeting and well-attended Sunday-school, and no preacher at all, will do a church that has an eloquent minister, a dull prayer-meeting and a neglected Sunday-school.

The prayer-meeting should be studied and prenared for, as much so as the sermon. Try to grash the whole situation. Who will be there? What can they do? How can I get them to do their hest? What hymne shall be sung? What wariety can be properly introduced?
