At 7.30 p. m. business was taken up. The committee on resolutions reported:

1. That the District Executive be instructed to prepare an outline plan of church business to be supplied to all the churches.
2. That pastors and churches are earnestly entreated to more regularly observe the Lord's Supper, and that it should be administered at least quarterly in each church.
3. That in every church there should be a mid-week prayer-meeting, and the brethren in the churches are urged to establish and maintain such meetings.

A vote of thanks to the Norton church and people for their hospitality was passed. It certainly was deserved.

The annual business meeting of the District W. M. Society was held in the Presbyterian Church Saturday afternoon. And at 8 p. m. the Society held a public meeting, both of which will be reported in proper departments by the secretary of the society.

At the close of the public missionary meeting the President of the Mission Society, Mrs. Weyman, the chairman of the District, Rev. B. H. Nobles and brethren Perry, Phillips, Currie and others presented the INTELLIGENCER to the people, speaking words of warm commendation. The Saturday evening programme was closed with an address on temperance—the church's responsibility, by Rev. Jos. McLeod.

Sunday was a pleasant day. Services were as follows: Sunday school at 9.30 a. m., conducted by Bro. J. E. Slipp; prayer meeting at 10.30, led by Rev. B. H. Nobles; preaching at 11 a. m., the annual sermon, by Rev. W. H. Perry; at 2.30 p. m., by Rev. Jos. McLeod; at 7.30 p. m., by Rev. C. T. Phillips; in the the Presbyterian church, at 11 a. m., by Rev. A. Perry; at Long Point, 11 a. m., by Rev. A. W. Currie; the Lord's Supper was administered at the close of the afternoon sermon, Revs. C. T. Phillips and A. Perry officiating. The congregations throughout the day were large, and there was a marked interest in all the services. After the sermon of Bro. Phillips in the evening there was a testimony meeting in which many took part and several young people expressed a desire to begin the Christian life. It was a good meeting. The session from beginning to close was one of more than ordinary interest, and we must believe that no little good will result from it.

THE TOBIQUE.—The time has come when I should again report the work in the Tobique field. Since the revival of last October, at Rowena, five others have decided for Christ, and will doubtless follow Him in baptism as soon as they have an opportunity. In April we organized a Y. P. C. E. S. of nineteen active members, which is doing good work. At Arthurette one soul has decided for God and continues active in our meetings, but thus far has not had the opportunity of following Christ in baptism and uniting with the church. At Long Island we have a faithful few who are still holding on to God by faith and hoping for better days. One has already come forward in our meetings, others are thinking seriously, and we

hope in the near future will decide wisely. As a result of three weeks special meetings, in which I was assisted by Rev. L. A. Fenwick, at Riley Brook, the church was greatly encouraged, four were baptized and three added to the church. There will be others, we believe, in the near future to unite with the church.

At present, beside my regular Sunday appointments, I have week night meetings at Foster Cove and Plaster Rock fortnightly; these meetings are well attended and a good interest is manifest. The Sabbath schools in all our churches are doing faithful work. As a whole the work is very encouraging. I am blessed with good health and enjoy the work that God has assigned me. I am becoming much attached to the people and deeply interested in them. Evidently God is blessing the work. Brethren pray for us.
