PARLIAMENT.

Monday.—The militia bill was taken up, and several sections passed. The bill disposes with the general commanding officer, substituting a militia council composed of the Minister of Militia, fourofficers and two civilians.

In the Senate, Senator McDonald gave notice that on the third reading of the G. T. P. bill he will move that none but British subjects shall be employed in the construction of the new national transcontinental railway. He said any one who followed Judge Winchester's enquiry would see how the alien labor law was being trampled on.

Tuesday.—The day was spent in further discussion of the militia bill.

Wednesday.—Mr. Borden moved an amendment to the Audit Act, giving the powers asked by the Auditor General, and spoke of the impartial way in which he had discharged his difficult duties. The discussion continued through afternoon and evening, and the amendment was lost by a vote of 56 to 94.

Thursday.—The railway bill was under discussion most of the day. An amendment in favor of the two cents a mile rate was voted down.

Friday.—Canal estimates engaged the attention of the House, Business is being hurried.
