The Mohammedans are about erecting a mosque in London.

The Vatican is sending Cardinal Salotti to the United States to make inquiry into Roman Catholicism there.

Colonel F. E. Younghusband, the British officer in command of the force now invading Tibet, is supposed to know more about Asia as any other man alive. He has travelled extensively in most of the explored regions.

The Elder-Dempster Steamship Co. has invited the Canadian Manufacturers' Association to send a deputation to South Africa to look into and study the trade situation, and offers to place a steamer at their disposal.

Mr. Chamberlain made his first speech since returning to England at Birmingham, Thursday. He discussed his fiscal policy with vigor, and said he would be glad to have the people declare upon it at once, and would not fear the result. The agitation, he said, would be kept up till it would be no longer a question, but a fact.
