The following report of the

COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE

was unanimously adopted:

"That we recognize the evil effects of intemperance, and the woe and misery attending the use and sale of intoxicating liquors in our Dominion, and believe it to be incumbent upon us as a denomination to put forth every effort to bring about its total prohibition. And it is the mind of your committee that the best means of bringing this about is through the enactment of a strict prohibitory law by the Dominion government, the acceptance of which shall be optional with each province.

We would also express our regret that the expectations of the temperance people of the Dominion, as far as legislative action being taken on the recent plebiscite vote, were disappointed, and we further condemn the action of the present government in their treatment of the matter.

We also regret that the use of tobacco is so prevalent, for in it we see an evil and a foe that are destructive to our youth and debasing to the morals of our men. We recognize it as a companion evil with the dread monster, rum, and recommend that

our people continue to fight these evils by preaching and working against them in harmony with the Scripture injunction, "Cleanse yourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of the Lord."

The following is a statement and report of the committee, which was unanimously adopted:

"To the honorable gentlemen of the Council of the County of Kings:

Gentlemen,—Inasmuch as tax bills have been presented to persons living for a short period in cottages built upon Beulah camp ground, owned by the Reformed Baptist Alliance, we wish, therefore, to make the following statements:

First,—That these grounds have been established purely for religious purposes.

Second,—That these grounds are owned by the Reformed Baptist Alliance, and are used by them for their general yearly meeting and camp meeting.

Third,—That the cottages have been built for the convenience and comfort of persons attending such meetings.

Fourth,—That all profits and money contributed during the meetings (except that given for missionary and like objects) are expended in improvements on and about the grounds, employing persons residing within the county to do the work.

Fifth.—That during the meetings and the time the cottages are occupied the supplies of provisions and produce are purchased principally from merchants and farmers in the vicinity.

Sixth.—That the establishment of Beulah Camp Ground has increased the value of property in the vicinity.

Therefore, we humbly ask that our people be relieved from further embarrassment by the presentation of tax bills on account of said property.

On motion, of Rev. G. W. McDonald the following resolution was passed:

"Whereas we believe the tendency of the times is toward extravagant living, and believing that we ought to set examples of economy and self-sacrifice in our Christian work,

Therefore Resolved, that we request the members of our church to set apart the first week in October as "Self Denial Week," and that a circular letter from this Alliance making the request, be sent to all the churches of the denomination.

On motion, Further Resolved, that a committee (Bro. C. K. Short) be appointed to prepare a card to be sent to all the churches, embodying the principle of this resolution, and that the amount thus saved in the self-denial week be stated on the card and for what purpose.

On motion, the report of committee of the whole was adopted.

Bro. C. K. Short from committee on grounds and tabernacle, presented a bill of \$150.58 for improvements.

On motion, the bill was referred to the auditor for examination and found correct.

On motion, Resolved that an order be drawn on the treasurer for the amt of \$16.00 for insurance on the Dormitory.

On motion, Resolved that an order be drawn on the treasurer for the amt of \$150.58, bill rendered by Bro. C. K. Short.

On motion, Resolved that Sister Kate McLeod be appointed Sunday School agent for the ensuing year.

On motion, Alliance adjourned to meet July 1st at 9 a. m. Closed by prayer.
