The sap, stock, blade and tassel of the corn stock are only evidences of corn life and find their perfection in the golden ear, so the fruit of the spirit are manifestations of the Christ life and find their end in souls influenced and won for God. God does not save us simply that we may be happy and go to heaven. These certainly are in the purpose of God, but yet he saves us that we may help to save others, and in this our happiness is increased and heaven will have more meaning.

At this season of the year we find barns, granaries, cellars and storehouses filled with fruits, all the result of hard toil, careful husbandry and patient waiting, so brethren let us go forth never wearying with toil, nor neglectful of opportunities or impatient as to the results, but as it is God who gives the increase let us do our all and then give it over to God. How blessed it is to see souls for whom we have laboured yielding to God, and I believe we can see many through faithful service, and yet far more than we can possibly conceive, if faithful to God through life, will be the joy when at the great garnering we are greeted by those, unknown on earth, with those we have known, we enter on our eternal reward, Dan. 12:3—And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever.

Brethren and sisters, are we living in holy communion with God, working, praying, waiting, that God may be glorified by our lives, and souls rise on eternal shores to call us blessed? Let us all join in prayer that a wave of Holy Ghost revival may sweep our entire field.

WHO HAS A RIGHT TO MARRY?

As we suggested in a previous issue of the HIGHWAY—some of the brethren sent in their names—others did not. A few made application for themselves and was therefore registered twice. Some of the brethren sent in their names who are not residing at present in the Province of N. B. hence could not obtain registry, as the Act says they must "have charge of a congregation in this Province, or be connected therewith." Through the kindness of Stephen B. Appleby, Q. C., of Woodstock, who drew up and prepared the necessary petition, the following ministers belonging to the Reformed Baptist Denomination in New Brunswick, have been registered in the Provincial Secretary's Office in Fredericton and have by this time received a Certificate to that effect, together with a copy of the late Marriage Act and a copy of the Royal Gazette containing the names of all ministers who are authorized to perform marriage in New Brunswick.

We notice the Act attaches a penalty of one hundred dollars and six months imprisonment to any one, attempting to solemnize any marriage, whose name has not been registered as required by this law.

General Kitchener's Abstainer's.

The British army has gathered the first experimental evidence bearing upon this military temperance question. Three regiments were selected from each of the several brigades, for tests at different times, partly during manoeuvres. In one, every man was forbidden to drink a drop while the test lasted; in the second, malt liquor only could be purchased; in the third, a sailor's ration of whisky was given

to each man. The experiment was repeated in several instances where forced marches and other hard work were required.

The whisky-drinkers showed more dash at first; but generally, in about four days, showed signs of lassitude and abnormal fatigue. Those given malt liquor displayed less dash at first, but their endurance lasted somewhat longer. The abstainers, however are said to have increased daily in alertness and staying powers.

As a result of this experiment, the British war department decided that in the last Soudan campaign not a single drop of stimulant should be allowed in camp, save for hospital use.—Washington Star.

The Old Man's Prayer.

In one of our city hospitals recently, the physicians were getting ready to perform an operation. The patient, an old man, was stretched upon the operating table, and when, at length, all was in readiness, one of the physicians approached with chloroform. The old man raised his hand, and said:
