The Bible in Conviction.

"If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded though one rose from the dead."

It is consoling in these days of "higher criticism" to observe what weight Christ laid upon the Holy Scriptures. The canon of the Scripture in his day was the Old Testament alone—"Moses and the prophets." If he laid so much weight on the Old Testament, what weight would he have placed on the entire book—the Old and the New?

No sign, no sight, no miracle, not even raising one from the dead, will compare in persuasive power with the Bible. Even in regard to entire sanctification, as well as conviction for regeneration. We are "sanctified through the truth." We have no use for any holiness (if there be no other) but "scriptural holiness." Our work is "to spread scriptural holiness over these and over all lands." No revival, no real religious experience, no sound conversion, no entire sanctification, no permanent upbuilding in Christian character, can be expected through any other instrumentality than the Bible. We must have Bible Christianity, Bible holiness, Bible doctrine, Bible experience, Bible behaviour. Hence the revival of the doctrine and experience and life of perfect love has been the cause as well as the effect of scriptural exposition. Every preacher of entire sanctification is driven sooner or later to make his appeal and to

ground his work on scriptural exposition. Salvation is by faith, not by sight. Visions, trances, extraordinary manifestations, spectacular demonstrations that seem almost like miracles, that seem almost like resurrections from the dead one and all put together, have not the persuasive power of Moses and the prophets and the gospels and the acts and the epistles, in a word "The word of God," the Bible. Christ says so in our text. We believe what he says. "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy Word is truth!"

Oppose the doctrine of Holiness! You oppose that which must prevail to save the world! This opposition to holiness is what retards the glorious work of salvation and perpetuates the work of the devil. Let holiness prevail, and as a consequence, the millennial glory dawns. Satan falls as lightning. Hallelujah! Sing from pole to pole, "The kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ: Glory to God in the highest! Let it come!" "Holiness to the Lord"—let it come! It must come!

It is as if you saw a locomotive engine upon a railway, and it would not go, and they put up a driver and they said, "Now that driver will just do." They try another and another. One proposes that such and such a wheel shall be altered; but still it will not go. Some one then bursts in among those that are conversing, and says, "No, friends, but the reason why it will not go is because there is no steam; you have no fire; you have no water in the boiler; that's why it will not go. It will go well enough if you but get the steam up." But now people are saying, "This must be altered and that must be altered." But the church's great want is the Holy Spirit; and until that is supplied, we may reform and reform, and still be just the same.—C. H. Spurgeon.
