

Notice of Travelling Arrangements

FOR ALLIANCE AND CAMP MEETING HELD FROM JUNE 26TH TO JULY 15TH INCLUSIVE.

By STEAMBOAT.

St. John River—On "Victoria," "David Weston," "Star," "Springfield" and "Hampstead," from Fredericton and points below pay one single fare to Camp Ground and secure certificate to be signed by the Secy of Alliance for free return passage at the close of Camp Meeting.

From Grand Manan to St. John by Str. "La Tour," a full return passage for \$2.00 and from Eastport to St. John by said steamer a full return passage for \$1.25.

On the D. A. Ry from any Station in N. S. via Yarmouth to St. John, pay a full first class fare to St. John, obtaining from the agent at starting point, a standard certificate, said certificate to be signed by the Secy of Alliance for return passage free.

All steamers on the St. John River (except May Queen) will give passage from St. John to Camp Ground for 25 cents with certificate or return, to be signed by the Secy of Alliance. An evening steamer will leave Camp Ground daily at 5.30 for St. John.

By RAILWAY.

On the C. P. Ry, procure from your agent a first-class return ticket, good for 30 days.

On the I. C. Ry, secure a first class single ticket to St. John, obtaining with ticket a standard certificate from the agent at station, said certificate to be signed by the Secy of Alliance, the agent at St. John on presentation of Certificate thus signed, will give a first class ticket for return passage free, providing ten or more delegates hold certificates of attendance at meetings; certificates good to July 18th.

On Shore Line Ry from St. Stephen to St. John procure a regular first class return ticket, good for 30 days—fare \$2.63.

PLEASE NOTICE that all persons not securing regular return tickets on Boat or Railway, must obtain with first-class single fare, STANDARD CERTIFICATES to be signed by Secy of Alliance, otherwise double fare will be required. Also give the Pursers and Agents your name and destination, when securing tickets and thus avoid misunderstandings.

Notice also that the Alliance and Camp-Meeting is from June 26th to July 15th inclusive.—Camp-Meeting beginning July 1st.

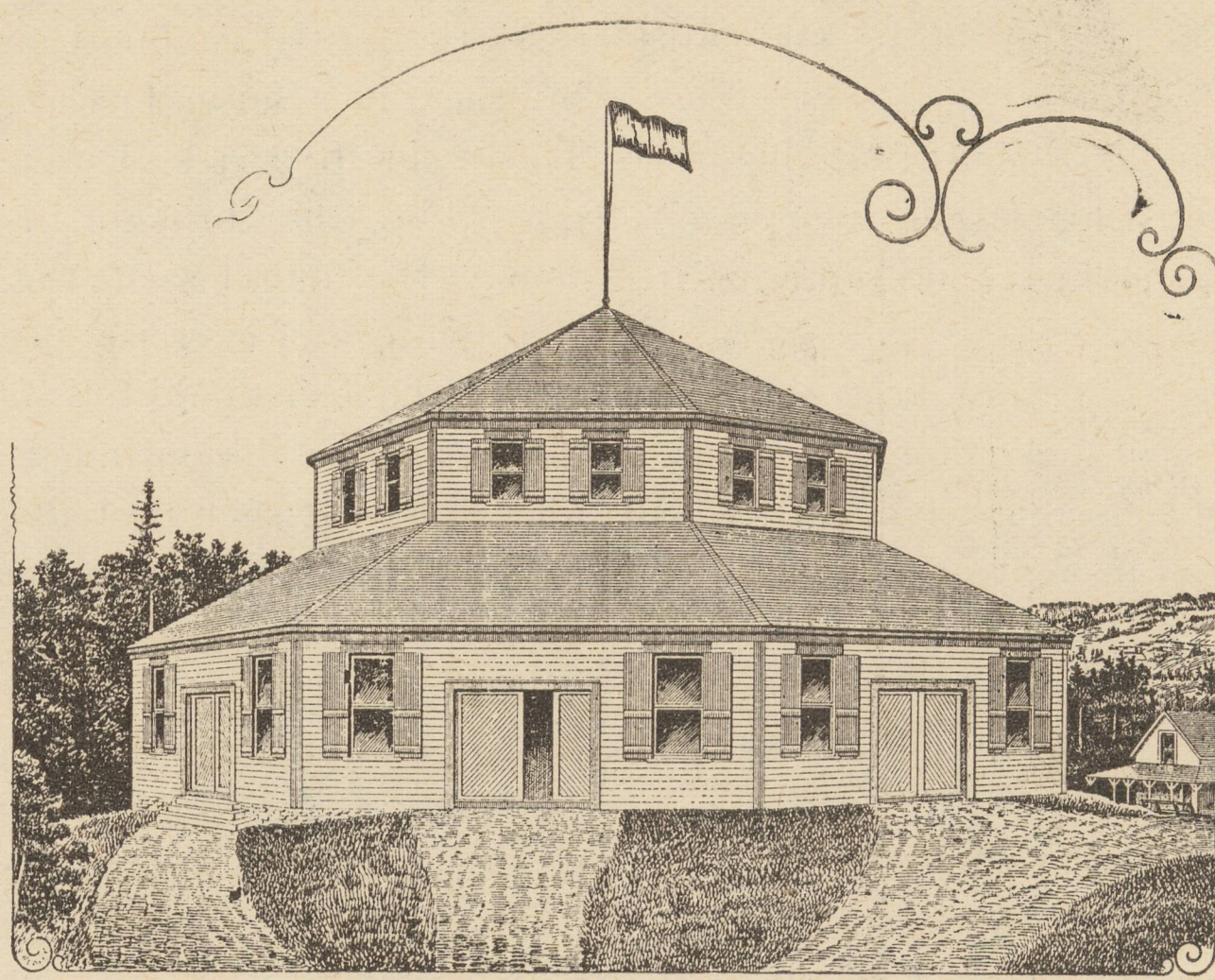
