THE HIGH CALLING OF GOD IN JESUS CHRIST.

1 Thes. 2:12. That ye walk worthy of God, who hath called you unto His kingdom and glory.

The writings of Paul like all the other sacred writings, abound in exhortations and encouragement.

In writing to the Ephesian, he exhorted them to "walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called"; to the Colossians that they "walk worthy of the Lord unto all pleasing, being fruitful in every good work, and increasing in the knowledge of God"; to the Hebrews, besides many others we have, "Wherefore, holy brethren, partakers of the heavenly calling, consider the Apostle and High Priest of our profession, Christ Jesus."

The religion of the Lord Jesus Christ elevates man, takes him from his low, lost, mired and hopeless, gloomy state and places him on a rock and puts a new song in his mouth.

The devil seeks to satisfy man with himself and the enjoyments of his surroundings, being himself carnal he offers man nothing but that, that will feed his carnal nature.

God offers man nothing of earth to satisfy him, and He being a holy spiritual being offers to man that, that will revivify and feed his spiritual nature. Hence Jesus laid down the spiritual law of the kingdom in the teaching that God is a spirit and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth.

The gospel seeks not to satisfy our affections with things earthly, but exhorts us to set our affections on things above, yea in the heavenlies. It tempts not our vision to the beauties of earthly toys, but its gaze is looking unto Jesus, and oh, how beautiful he becomes, the more steadfastly we behold him. Yea, he becomes exceeding precious, the fairest among ten thousands.

We are not to walk to please our fellow men, nor are we to walk to unnecessarily displease them. Our text says, Walk worthy of God.

Walk worthy of the name of children of God, professing to be his

children, let us not try to act as though we were of another family, let us live like God's children ought to live, walk as becometh those professing godliness. Professing to know God, let us walk in the knowledge of his will.

God is not ashamed to be called our God, for he hath prepared for us a city. God has and will perform all he has covenanted, let us perform all our vows.

"Both he that sanctifieth and they who are sanctified are all of one, wherefore he is not ashamed to be called their brethern," think of it, and we are to walk worthy, answerable to every demand upon us.

We stop and marvel as we go on in this text, at the calls of God. He has called us to his kingdom. Doubtless there is much of this that is in store for the future, if we are to enjoy, as possibly we are led to hope, the pleasure of a millennial kingdom, yet this is not all, there is an eternity to be forever with God. However much there may be for future enjoyment, there is a great deal to be enjoyed and experienced here. All that we shall be in eternity has its beginning here.

The great future is not to develop new characters or beget new relationship. As we go so shall we be, hence the necessity of being sons here, if not here, never, and also the absolute demand of holiness here, for if not here, never. "He that is filthy, let him be filthy still."

How few of God's people stop to think of their call to the kingdom. God calls sinners to repentance that they might have reconciliation and sonship, but his call to the kingdom is not only reconciliation and sonship but a princely life and the utter banishment of every thing that would prevent us in the kingdom or hinder the laws of the kingdom operating in our hearts. The word tells us, the carnal mind is enmity to God and is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be, hence carnality must go and Paul says, the old man is crucified.

The kingdom of God is not meat and drink, ceremony or ordinance, but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Ghost; bless God the whole thing is spiritual and sets man right with God, restores and establishes peace and gives the abiding joy of the Holy Ghost.

What is the matter with such a large percentage of God's people singing, prone to wander Lord I feel it, instead of them singing. O glorious way O purified band, enjoying this walk with my Lord. The trouble, they have not been considering their high calling. They have allowed carnality to harass them when they might have been sanctified wholly.

The kingdom of God is not in word but in power. Thank God it is something more than a claim, it is a possession, delivered out of the hand of our enemies, we serve him in righteousness and holiness all the days of our life, power to be and power to do.

What is the power of the kingdom, not cultured brain or brilliant talent, not personal magnetism, not wealth or social position, yet these can all be used, and the more God finds in us the more he can use.

Jesus says, tarry ye until ye be endued with power from on high, "Ye shall receive the power of the Holy Ghost coming upon you," yea the power of the kingdom is in the baptism with the Holy Ghost, he to use the brain, the talent, the personality, the wealth and social position always to the glory of God, never to the exaltation of self.

This brethern, is our calling, our

privilege; this the surety of possession of all that may be in the future.

Again we notice the call is also to his glory—think of it, glory. We have deserved shame, yet we shall receive glory. Glory! Yes the word says glory. If we suffer with them we shall also reign with him.

If our life is hid with Christ in God, when he who is our life shall appear, we shall appear with him also in glory. We shall be like him for we shall see him as he is.

Glorious here, showing forth the praises of him who hath called us out of darkness into his marvellous light. Some day, perhaps not far distant, we shall know the blessedness of this calling in all its fullness as Psalm 73:24, "Thou shalt guide me with thy counsel, and afterward receive me to glory." Amen.
