

faithful forty souls who were bound together in the organization stood for. We also stand for the regenerate church membership. We feel that no one has a right to a place in the church until they are first born of God. Only for such people who have been regenerated do we teach the possibility of entire sanctification. He gave a short talk on "How we sustain the work," and said that never has a dollar been raised by church fairs or suppers. In all the work it is sustained by voluntary contribution.

The cost of the building as now completed with church above and dwelling below, which is sometimes used as a parsonage, is \$3,233. There was a debt of \$1,300 on the dedication of the church, and then it was decided to raise a sinking fund by quarterly contributions by a number of the members, which would amount to \$100 a year, such amount to be paid annually until the discharge of the mortgage. Early in January of this year the pastor began to talk to the people of raising the amount to pay the balance of the church debt, then \$600. Accordingly on January 20, in a union holiness meeting, Joseph Bullock made a proposition to the church in their efforts that for every dollar they raised he would give one. They were given two months to raise the amount and accordingly on March 20, they had collected \$350 in cash and the subscriptions to bring the amount to \$400. Mr. Bullock paid the \$300 as agreed, and the church debt and mortgage was discharged. Some interest and other expenses were incurred to the amount of about \$100, which they expect soon to clear. The pastor asked at the meeting for \$50 to cover all needs, and a collection was taken up amounting to \$27 50.

The present outlook of the church is prosperous, and we can say with the words of the Psalmist: "The Lord has done great things for us whereof we are glad," and after short talks by Deacons John Kimball and E. Cosman, the meeting was thrown open for a general praise service for half an hour.

The meeting closed with the singing of the hymn, "When the roll is called up."

After the benediction had been pronounced a suitable souvenir in the shape of a pamphlet with cuts of the church and pastor on it was presented to each one present.
