He may be surrounded with good, but he cannot see any good in it, people getting blessed all about him, but he attributes it to something else and says there is nothing in it for him. 3rd. There are no cool springs or wells of living waters from which he drinks, and no refreshing showers from heaven upon his soul. He inhabits the parched places in the theological wilderness, with bewilderingly mixed ideas of the ways of salvation.

For he shall be as a tree planted by the waters, and that spreadeth her roots by the river, and shall not see when heat cometh, but her leaf shall be green; and shall not be careful in the year of drought, neither shall cease from yielding fruit.
