When we sent our letters to the Alliance we could not tell when he could take this long expected trip but in just a little while all was made so clear and plain even as to the very day he was to leave. Had he been one day behind he would have miss ed important connections in travelling and delays are expensive things here in Africa with the cheapest hotel fares from \$2.50 and upwards, per day.

We know you are all praying for us and it does so give us courage, help and strength to remember this. God is answering prayer and is going to do wonder-0 ful things for us according to our faith. 00 By us I am reckoning in you at home who are so faithfully holding the ropes. Is your faith steady and are you expect ing God to fulfill his own promises? Let not failure come through some brother's or sister's lack of faith. We are not digging African gold nor the diamonds Kimberly but we are seeking those things which shall endure when gold and diamonds will have passed away, precious imortal souls.
