TIMELY SUGGESTIONS FOR BEULAH.

Beulah needs another large dormitory, containing from 30 to 40 rooms. It is not a question for getting a crowd this year, but the question of caring for the crowd, it needs no prophet to foresee this fact.

A row of cottages extending from brother B. N. Goodspeed's cottage to the dormitory, has been suggested for the use of the ministers and workers, free of rent. We wish some of the Lord's Stewards would rise up and say, here is the cash, go ahead, and we would go.

It would be a good improvement to frost the lower panes in the Tabernacle windows, and to put in two light-swinging doors in the large doors of the tabernacle, one next to the dormitory, the other on the side toward the grove, to do away with the noise made by rolling back the large doors. The lamps that are now in the tabernacle should be changed to hang out nearer the outside of the building, and a large centre lamp put in, and half circle shades put on the lamps that light the platform, which would throw more light on the platform, and do away with the glare of the light in the eyes of the congregation.

The establishment of a permanent library of holiness books, which the people can have access to while stopping on the grounds, for a small fee, instead of buying one or two books to carry home. Also raise a fund for free tract distribution. That the KING'S HIGHWAY should be brought before the meetings in a special way, and its subscription list greatly increased, and the HIGHWAY made an eight page paper, and published weekly.

And let us pray that the Lord may send us consecrated laymen to take charge of the several departments, so that all the ministers may be free to look after the spiritual interests of the meetings, and that great victory may be enjoyed during the entire encampment.

The Robie church at a recent meeting voted \$30.00 for the Macdonald memorial fund from the church and mission band and \$15.00 for the little Syrian girl that the church is educating in Palestine, through the Society of Friends, and about \$100.00 toward the support of a native worker in connection with the Reformed Baptist South African Mission. This church is small in membership, but large in benevolence, including the expense of the convention at Fort Fairfield they have raised this year about \$1000.00, this is good evidence from a financial standpoint, of a live church, but this is only one way that they manifest life, no storm has been so severe, nor roads so bad, as to prevent holding a single meeting during the year, nor has their zeal slackened, nor testimony weakened, and it can be truly said of them that they are one in the unity of the Spirit. We close our labors with this church as pastor May 1st but our appreciation of them as a band of truly sanctified people and our fellowship we expect will continue world without end.

QUARTERLY MEETING.

REPORTS OF CHURCHES.

Woodstock—We have great reason to be thankful to Almighty God for his wonderful kindness during the year. The Spirit of God has been manifest in our midst. The church has secured the services of Pastor Wiggins for another year. The work of finishing the church is about completed. The Sunday school is flourishing under the care of C. N. Scott Supt.

Hartland—The services are held regularly, and are seasons of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. A good many of the members have moved away from the place, and the church with the loss of denomination, deeply mourn the loss of our recent pastor, Rev. G. W. MacDonald. But it seems to come specially near us as he has been our pastor for two years. Rev. A. H. Trafton is supplying our pulpit. The Sunday school is under the care of Brother Arthur Baird; a good interest is manifest in the work.

Meductic church,—In offering our quarterly report, we desire to acknowledge the goodness of God to us, in all things. Our church has suffered by the removal from the place of some of its workers, but those who remain are true to their covenant and to the Lord. All the services have been fairly well sustained during the winter. Brother Archer's preaching is helpful, and the congregations are good.

Millville church,—Our meetings are regularly kept up, and are well attended. We hold two prayer meetings during the week which are seasons of refreshing. The Lord is with us in the work and we are very much encouraged to go forward.

Nortondale church,—On account of diphtheria in the community, meetings were suspended during the first part of the winter, and lately the roads were so bad that our pastor could not meet his appointments. We have no Sunday school but we are praying for and expecting better times in the future.

Maple Ridge Church,—On account of storms and bad roads, our meetings are not as well attended as we would like. Our Sunday school is in a flourishing condition and very encouraging.

Mapleton Church,—Work is encouraging, good is being done, a deepening work of grace is being felt by all.

Upper Haynesville Church,—Meetings are held every two weeks, no regular prayer meetings, no Sunday school, our number is small, but our meetings are in-

teresting, the attendance good, during January and February we had no meetings on account of bad roads. We are looking forward hopefully.

Lower Haynesville Church,—We all enjoy the preaching services, but for two months we have been deprived of them on account of stormy weather and bad roads, our prayer meetings are good. Bro. Coy our pastor has not been idle, he held special meetings at Hawkins Corner and at Bull Lake and a number have been converted and they expect to have baptism soon. He anticipates holding a tent meeting there in the summer.

Greentush Church,—We have preaching regularly twice a month, covenant meeting monthly.

Middle Southampton Church,—Meetings well attended, converts are holding true to God, work is encouraging.

Lower Southampton Church,—The outlook is very encouraging, a spirit of unity prevails. We have preaching monthly, prayer meetings weekly.

Peniac Church,—We are doing fairly well, our regular services are kept up and we are united in the work and mean to go forward and expect in the near future to hold special meetings and are looking to God for victory.

Marysville Church,—Prayer meetings on Sunday morning and twice during the week and preaching meetings Sunday evenings followed by a social service. The attendance is good and meetings are seasons of refreshing. We have had special services, the pastor being assisted by brethren Moore, Rogers, Trafton and Burpee, of Woodstock, Sister Jessie Hooper who recently returned from India and Rev. M. S. Trafton of St. John, they were seasons of deep heart searching by the holy Spirit, and of deep conviction which resulted in sinners being converted, wanderers reclaimed, and believers sanctified wholly, and the members greatly helped. Our Sunday school is in good condition, Bro. J. H. Steeves, Supt. This circuit has extended a unanimous invitation to Brother G. B. Trafton to remain pastor for an indefinite period.

Mouth of Nashwaak Mission,—Preaching every Sunday afternoon. Prayer meeting once a week, all of which are well attended and a good interest manifested; a good work is being done for the Lord. We have a good Sunday school connection with this mission. We also in connection with this circuit, conduct an evangelistic meeting every Monday night in Fredericton, at the home of Sister Esterbooks. The attendance is increasing, a number are in the experience of holiness. The future outlook is bright.

Rev. G. B. MacDonald gave a very bright and encouraging report of the work on Grand Manan.

Brothers Archer and Wiggins presented the claims of the HIGHWAY.

Rev. W. B. Wiggins gave all a pressing invitation to attend the dedicatory services of the Woodstock church, to be held June 7th, next. Next quarterly meeting is to be held at Gibson, beginning June 11th. Preaching Saturday evening by Rev. G. B. MacDonald; Sunday 10.30 W. B. Wiggins; 2.30, H. C. Archer; 7.30, G. B. MacDonald. The attendance was large and interest good throughout. The services were continued by pastor assisted by the brethren present.
