All real prayer is born in the heart.

GOD'S PEOPLE IN THE DEVIL'S TERRITORY.

And when they entered unto the heathen, whither they went, they profaned my holy name, when they said to them, these are the people of the Lord, and are gone forth out of his land.—Eze. 36:20.

There are many professed Christians who do not stop to consider the reproach they bring upon the cause of Christ by going to places that they should not, and by taking part in things they should not. They should quit, if for no other reason than the reproach to Christ. "For the reproaches of them that reproached thee fell on me."

If a professed Christian, holding ever so obscure a place in the christian church, enters a theatre or any place of worldly amusement, there is some one to point him out with the words, "There is one of the people of the Lord who is gone forth out of his land." How often the same words are repeated aside in the select company, where they have the parlour dance, and progressive euchre parties, or in fact in any place where there is the least compromise, there are keen eyes that behold it, and call attention to the fact, that "These are the people of the Lord, and are gone forth out of his land."

It would be difficult to estimate the number of professed Christians in the

evangelical churches who are mingling with the world with scarcely a distinguishing mark except an occasional exhortation, or partaking of communion.

God's estimate of this state of things is expressed to the prophet. Son of man, when the house of Israel dwelt in their own land, they defiled it by their own way and by their doings; their way was before me as the uncleanness of a removed woman.

As much as we may regret it this is generally speaking a fact. But there are a few in almost every church who in heart mourn over this state of things.

God's remedy is first to gather his people and separate them from the world, into their own land, "Then will I sprinkle clean water upon you, and ye shall be clean: from all your filthiness, and from all your idols, will I cleanse you, a new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you: and I will take away the stony heart out of your flesh, and I will give you an heart of flesh." Eze. 36:25-26.

There is a great contrast between the satisfaction derived from the pleasure obtained by mixing with the world in its chaff like enjoyment and the satisfaction derived from being separated from the world, and being made clean by the precious blood of Christ, from all filthiness, inward and outward, a new spirit within, the stony heart taken away, filled with the Holy Spirit, power given to walk in God's statutes and judgements, and to do them "and ye shall be my people, and I will be your God." We can only compare the pleasure derived from the world as chaff that the least breath of air will blow away. But that derived from full salvation as gold that even fire cannot consume, but can only purify and refine it.

In November, 1901, she married Perry H. Smith, also a graduate of the same school, in the class of 1899, and has since made her home with her husband on their farm in Westfield.
