PAULPIETERSBURG, Natal,
April 12th 1904.

Dear Friends,—Last Saturday we laid away the remains of a Gwaiman to await the resurrection You may remember our speaking of him as the consumptive. "We had been here only about two weeks when he came asking for medicine to cure a pain in his chest. He was then told that his case was incurable and that he had better become a christian. He thought this advice good and acted upon it, coming regularly to the services. We

all were sorry that he was not ready for baptism with the others. But at that time he was bound by two things that he believed to be sins. In his frank way he told us that he loved his pipe and snuff and like his young men companions, loved many girls whom he desired to take as wives. Later he had a dream that helped him to decide to give up all for Christ. In this dream he saw many Christians, some of whom he knew, clothed in white and entering heaven. Among them he noticed some who still used tobacco, but these went with the unbelievers into the pit. He took this as a direct warning from God and from that time had a bright and steady experience. Last Wednesday I was to see him and enquired if he feared to die. He said that of death itself he was afraid, but did not fear to meet God as he knew that all his sins were taken away. We prayed together and parted not to meet again before Jesus comes. His mother, who remained with him told us that during the night he prayed aloud and in the morning died from hemorrhage without a word or hardly a struggle. I expect to see him among the blood washed and we may hear him thanking his Saviour that the gospel reached him just in time.

Dear Highway.—It was very encouraging and interesting at class yesterday, to hear the report of work done during the week by the members. These Christians are only babes in Christ and I am burdened that they may receive "the promise of the Father." They are learning a grand collection of scripture texts and how to use them in answering the ones who make excuses when asked to come and hear the gospel. Our subject was 2 Kings, the 7th chapter, which contains a valuable lesson for us as well as for them.

Here we see a city of shut in, helpless and starving people, which well illustrates the heathen world. But God had compassion and prepared good food in abundance, and for all. The four leprous men who were the first to eat, may be taken to represent the church of Christ in as much as they were the ones to bear the "good tidings."

We remember what Paul said to the Romans, "I am a debtor to all men." I have often tried to understand clearly how it was that the apostle was thus in debt to the world. It was because he possessed a salvation that has been prepared for all men and one of the conditions upon which he received it was that he pass it on. Yes, the knowledge of this salvation is due all mankind, it is their property, bought for them and paid for on Calvary. Now who is it that holds this property that belongs to the heathen? Who is it thus in debt? "Not I," we say, "I pay all my debts." "Is it Christ? No, His part 'is finished.' Is it the angels? No, they are denied the privilege of telling the good news. Whose hands, then, hold this property that belongs to other people? We all know, we are the guilty ones—blood guiltiness—and we are awfully in debt. Had those four lepers refused to tell the starving ones of the food supply that God had supplied for them all, what would have been the result to themselves and the hungry ones? So at the judgement, methinks, I can see those who sank in heathen darkness, rise up and accuse Christians. They may say, "Did not God prepare salvation for all—for us—then why did you not tell us?" And Christ may add, When you accepted salvation did you not agree to meet my conditions, to keep my commandments? And the great commandment [Matt. 28:19, 20.] you have not kept. You left the city of destruction, and ate of the food I had prepared for all, but there you sat down and remained leaving the millions for whom I died ignorant of my very name. Their blood I now require at your hands." Then will rise before our quickened vision scenes of neglected privileges, lost opportunities, misspent time; that withheld consent for our dear ones to follow the Master's call, or the withheld money; and we may find ourselves "in heaven, but not of heaven."

Dear Brethren and Sisters,—Last Sunday a young man who has been here but twice, seemed to be under conviction, and prayed in our meeting. Should all the people come to our services after harvest that have promised to, we should need a large building to accommodate them; but I fear that it is with them as with many at home who are waiting for a more convenient season.

Last week a man who had come on other business told me a bit of his history. When only a boy he had left his home for work among the white people. There he attended church learning thoroughly the way of salvation through Christ. But after earning the necessary number of cows returned home, married one wife and settled down among his heathen

relatives to live, for the most part, as they do. He drank beer with them, smoked, took snuff, attended the dances, etc., but could not join them in offering meat and beer to the departed dead. But during these years he has not enjoyed peace of mind. A great burden he says, has rested upon his shoulders. The fear of death has constantly haunted him, because his fault before God, as he expressed it is great; for knowing the right way, he has not walked in it, nor has he passed on the wonderful light to his neighbors who still sit in darkness.

I am much burdened for this wretched man. His case seems to me the saddest I know of in this district. He needs our prayers and help, and some day we may see him free from Satan's chains and letting his light shine.

Though so long kept waiting for the land on which to build, yet we know that God is with us, and we doubt not, is leading into just what He has planned. We begin to catch glimpses of His grand purpose for this work. He is soon to do great things for us, and in such a way that all with spiritual vision will see His hand working and give Him the glory.

At present it is our privilege to honor God by a faith that will stand His tests. Remember, "the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth. And though Jesus loved Martha, and her sister, and Lazarus. When He heard therefore that he was sick, He abode two days still in the same place where He was."
