RIVERSIDE CAMP MEETING.

Rev. Aura Smith and three children arrived at Riverside on Friday morning 5th inst. The first meeting was held at 7.30 p. m., after singing several hymns a sea-on of prayer was led by Rev. J. N. Noble. Sister Smith sang a solo entitled "The Name of Jesus" which warmed all hearts. Rev. Aura Smith read the second chapter of Acts, which he took for his subject. He said, They met by the command of Jesus, both men and women, "They were all with one accord in one place," he emphasized the word "suddenly" and drew strong, logical, and very helpful lessons the emblems illustrating the power of the Holy Spirit. Wind, fire, water, it was a timely and helpful service.

Saturday 10 a. m., was a prayer, praise, and testimony meeting, led by Rev. S. A. Baker, who read acts 4 23 to 33 it was a time of much blessing continuing up to 12 a. m.

2.30 p. m. opened by several hymns and prayers, and a solo "Where Shall We Go," by Sister Smith. Rev. Aura Smith was in charge gave a bible reading on believing prayer that added much territory to be taken within the limits of faith.

7.00 p. m. song service; 7.30 solo, Sister Smith. Rev. Aura Smith took for his text Mark 16-16 "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." There was no uncertain sound in the message, the line drawn was straight, and all were located, there was no neutral ground.

Sunday was a good day at Riverside Camp Meeting there was 3000 people present, who were very orderly for so large a crowd. It was estimated that there was 500 horses and carriages in and about the grounds, the new barn which accommodates 52 horses was quickly filled and more stalls. The tabernacle was filled at every preaching service by an attentive company of people, and several were at the altar at every service, most of whom claimed to get victory through the precious blood. The services began at 6 a. m. with a meeting for prayer. At 9 a. m. there was a love feast, which was a season of the Spirits presence with power, led by Rev. W. B. Wiggins, B. A., Rev. M. S. Trafton preached at 10.30, it was a season of blessing concluding with a rich altar service. A children's meeting was conducted by Mrs. (Rev.) Aura Smith at 1 p. m. Rev. Aura Smith preached at 2.30 p. m., from 1 Thess 5-23-24, and at 7.30 from Amos 4-12 both sermons were strong and logical presentations of gospel direct to the hearts and consciences of the people which brought forth visible results

as many came to the altar and were helped at both services. There were rich services of song led by Sister Smith preceding each preaching service. Sister Smith possesses a strong well trained musical voice, and sings solos very effectively, and she is an all round good worker and we have no hesitancy in saying that Rev. Aura Smith and wife are the kind of workers that would be helpful to any pastor or church that wants good practical and scriptural help.

Brother J. F. Bullock presided at the organ and in his quiet way gave impetus to the services.

We had good weather, good preaching; good music and singing, good testimonies, good cases of salvation, good food at the hotel, and good results financially, and good order, so all round it was a real good day.

Monday, 10.00 a. m.—Rev. A. H. Trafton preached from John 17-17, "Thy word is truth." Several were at the altar.

2.30 p. m.—Rev. J. N. Noble preached from Gal. 5-7, "Ye did run well; who did hinder you that ye should not obey the truth?" At the altar service which followed two or three entered into beulah rejoicing.

7.30 p. m.—Rev. Aura Smith took for his text Mark 10-21, "One thing thou lackest." It was a good, practical and forceful sermon, illustrated by many incidents coming under his personal observation. A number were at the altar and found pardon or purity of heart.

Tuesday, 9.30 a. m.—Mrs. C. C. Clark led a testimony meeting. She read Judges 6-11 to 40, from which she drew many good and helpful thoughts, followed by a large number of testimonies.

10.30 a. m.—Rev. Aura Smith gave a bible reading, subject, "Purified for service," beginning with John 15-2. He said the text spoke of three classes of branches, viz., no fruit, some fruit, more fruit. 2 Tim. 2-19 to 21, The lowest standard of grace taught in the bible is to depart from evil. Titus 2-14, "Zealous of good works." Zec. 13-1, "The opened fountain." In speaking of the double cure he said that "Rock of Ages" was not written by a Methodist, but by a Calvinist. Heb. 13-12 and Eph. 5-25, "He died that he might sanctify the people," (the church.) Examples, Job 11-4, 2 Kings 20-3. "The same blessing to all," Acts 15-9.

2.30 p. m.—Rev. W. B. Wiggins preached from Matt. 6:33, "Seek first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." The order of things in this world has been inverted. God is endeavouring to rectify man's mistakes. He sends out his servants for this purpose. The text is one of God's rectifications of man's ideas.

I. The commandment "seek" first the kingdom of God, that is, salvation. We cannot "see the kingdom of God," says Jesus, unless we are "born of God." Then, regeneration brings us into the kingdom of God. To obtain this, we must seek it with all our heart until we find. Here many fall and yet are into the church, but dissatisfied. They have not sought aright and until they found. 2nd. We are to seek "God's righteousness"—which is sanctification—the second blessing. To obtain this we must go to the right source, and seek in the right way. We must make an entire consecration, and pray and believe. Many fail to obtain because they fail in their seeking. We must seek importunately—seek until you find.

II. The promise, all things needful shall be added, which I have proved to be true.

A grand altar service followed.

7.30 p. m.—Rev. Aura Smith preached from John 1:29, "Behold the lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world." He gave several illustrations to distinguish between sin and

sins. He said that the first Baptist was a holy man. The whole sermon was to the point, strong, practical and effectual.

Wednesday, 9.00 a. m.—Rev. Henry Smith, of Yarmouth, N. S., gave an excellent opening address from Psalms 92:14, "They shall still bring forth fruit in old age; they shall be fat and flourishing." He said in justification you are planted in the house (or kingdom) of the Lord. Verse 13. In sanctification you are rooted and grounded in love. He distinguished between being planted, rooted and grounded. Of bearing fruit in old age he said that the older the tree, the larger and sweeter the fruit.

10.30 a. m.—Rev. S. A. Baker preached from 1 Peter, 1:22, "Seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit unto unfeigned faith of the brethren, see that ye love one another with a pure heart fervently." He said doubtless these were the same people who were converted on the day of Pentecost. They were good people "elect" and sanctified. Verse 2. A kept people. Verse 5. But still they had trials. Verses 6-7. Purity is spoken of here as in Acts 15:9 in the past tense. We purify our souls by appropriating God's provisions for that purpose. It is done by believing and obeying the truth, faith and action. The point reached is illustrated by the effect viz, unfeigned love, real, genuine, sincere, pure love. What is better on earth than a friend who will not betray your confidence. Jesus made love the test of discipleship. All Christians need the exhortation of this text. Our text plainly declares purity as an experience for this life. Tells how it is obtained and its effect, and the need of an intensified love. Every advance step of true christian experience intensifies our love to God and toward each other, all other steps are to be suspected.

Every day at 1 p. m. Mrs. (Rev.) Aura Smith conducted a childrens meeting and many little hearts were given to the Saviour. "Suffer the little children to come to me and forbid them not for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

2.30 p. m.—Rev. Aura Smith preached from 1 Thess 4 3. He said these people were Pauls own converts, and they had never backslidden and yet he prayed "right and exceedingly that he might see them face to face, and right perfect that which was lacking in their faith, 1 Thess 3-2 and that they might be sanctified wholly. There were eight who got brightly saved at the altar service which followed.

7.30 p. m.—Rev. Aura Smith preached from Joshua 24-15, "And if it seem evil unto you to serve the Lord, choose you this day whom ye will serve" He said Joshua was one of the strong characters of the bible. He was a man of faith, and courage. It takes genuine courage to get religion, more courage than to face the cannon in war. Many are lost for the want of it.

Brother J. F. Bullock added much to the success of the Camp Meetings by his punctual and regular attention as organist, and his skill not only in the profession, but in throwing in the right hymn at the right time. All appreciate his help so freely and faithfully given.

The Camp Meeting closed Sunday night with full altars seeking salvation, and the people lingered long after the service closed singing and marching and praising God. Hundreds testified to rich definite blessing.
