

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL AGENT.

For the Year Ending June 30th, 1904.

DEAR BRETHREN AND SISTERS,—

It is with great pleasure that we lay before you again our annual report of our Sunday school work. In many ways the work has prospered. The interest in our work in some of our churches has greatly increased, and in some churches it has somewhat lessened. We regret to say this, as it should not be. The Sunday school is an important branch of the Christian church. It is from our Sunday schools that we must draw our young men and women to carry on our church work in the future. And very much depends upon the interest and education that our scholars are receiving at the present time in our Sunday schools.

Our schools are also much interested, we are glad to say in our foreign mission work. They are also in good condition spiritually, as a large number of our scholars have been blessedly converted. We see a great future before us and we must keep our Sunday school work to the front and urge upon all of our churches the paramount importance of this branch of Christian work. Some of our Sunday schools have suffered loss by death and thus promoting to greater blessedness those who have loved the Sunday school, but our sad loss is their greater gain. We would urge upon all our schools the necessity of sending full reports every year. Most all of our school are evergreen. We have reason therefore to thank God for the work that has been done during the past year, and so we will take courage for the future. I will now lay before you the reports of the schools as I have been enabled to gather them.

WOODSTOCK.—The secretary writes:—I am glad to say that our school is on the upgrade. Our teachers are quite faithful in attendance, unless away on some mission doing good elsewhere. There seems to be a good spiritual atmosphere in the school, especially shown in the singing, as all that can sing do sing, and strangers coming in, often remark of the life and vigor of the school; and how can it be otherwise when the Blessed Holy Spirit is present to help us. ST. JOHN.—In making out our yearly report we can truly say God's blessing is upon us. Our school is increasing in number and interest. Bro. E. However, in fine weather our attendance is quite large, including a number of adult people. The interest in our school and its work is very good. MERCER SETTLEMENT.—This school has been running since May 14th. It is in good condition, but they lack teachers. The superintendent lives about 4 miles away and it makes it hard for him. We hold a prayer meeting after the school, which is helpful to all. Number of scholars enrolled 40.—Com.

NORTH HEAD.—This school is in a good spiritual condition. The superintendent and teachers are untiring in their efforts and united in the work. School is evergreen. Number of scholars enrolled 125.—Com.

SEAL COVE.—In reporting our school we are glad to say that the interest is very good and we are encouraged to press forward the work. Our juvenile classes are large and the interest in the work is increasing. The school is evergreen. Number of scholars on roll 70.—Com.

SANDFORD, N. S.—This school is evergreen, and has a very good attendance. We think the interest is constantly increasing. Number of scholars on the roll 40.—Com.

BRAZIL LAKE, N. S.—We are glad to report that our school is advancing. Better attendance than last year and better interest. Our school is open six months in the summer. Number of scholars on the roll 27.—Com.

PORT MAITLAND, N. S.—Our school was organized in May 1903 and much interest was felt and shown, but on account of absence and sickness of some of our members it has somewhat decreased. However, God has blessed us as a school. We are trusting Him for future success and greater victories. School is evergreen. Number of scholars on roll 26.—Mrs. W. S. Sollows, Supt.

WESTCHESTER, N. S.—Our school has been organized only a year. There is a good interest in the school. School evergreen. Number of scholars enrolled 50.—Mrs. E. S. Williams, Sec'y.

AMHERST, N. S.—This school was started some five months ago in the home of Sister M. E. Pugsley, with about 6 scholars, but in answer to prayer God has gradually added to our numbers and blessed our efforts and on June 26th we were organized with a good staff of officers, teachers and scholars. They are all interested and God may richly bless us in the work. Number of schools enrolled 24.—Com.

GEARY.—This school was started the first of May and runs through the summer. A good interest is shown. Number of scholars enrolled 25.—Com.

MILLVILLE.—This school is union. It is evergreen. Number of scholars enrolled 90.—Com.

CALAIS, ME.—Our school has been kept open during the year. Although the attendance has been small, still quite an interest has been taken on the part of the scholars. The collections for our supplies are larger than last year. School is evergreen. Number of scholars enrolled 30.—Mrs. E. Doyle, Sec'y.

BEALS, ME.—Our school is in a grand condition spiritually. A large number (21) of our scholars have been converted. Since the special meetings were held in the spring our school has increased in numbers. We have now a large Bible class taught by the pastor. We have had many hindrances in our work, as our church was closed for 8 weeks. But God kept us alive spiritually and wondrously blessed us and we have had victory. CORRESPONDENCE.

PAULPIETERSBURG, Natal, June 24, 1904.

Dear Highway:—Since last I wrote many changes have taken place with us. We have rented a large farm, have moved out to it and are living in our tent, while building a little house. We have been in Africa over two years but never used the tent till now. Once was offered a big price for it but refused to sell it, saying "we do not now see the need of it but God does somewhere in the future, so we will keep it." Without it I do not see what we would do now. It is large and we have divided it into three parts, bedroom, dining-room and a place to store our things. True the sun even in winter (tis now mid-winter with us) gets hot in the daytime, and it is cold in the night, still we are very happy with all the little inconveniences that daily arise. As tent life was new to me I did wonder how I was to bake bread but by moving the stove out of doors and planning so as to cook in the morning, before the wind gets up, I can do nicely, for this I am very thankful as there are no bakeries out here on the veldt, ours is the last habitation of civilization save the camp of two white police some few miles to the north of us. Since coming here hundreds of people have visited us as they passed to and fro and we have still better advantages to talk with them before. Some are willing, others make excuses, some are troubled with great opposition and others are indifferent to it all. They never knew before of eternity, why should they bother now. Some say they are too old, others they just want to get married and settle down. You see human nature is just the same beneath a black skin and Satan is just as eager to deceive these people as those at home.

To say we are busy is putting it pretty mild but we are endeavoring to preach the word in season and out of season. Our patience is daily tried over the slowness with which things move here, and we do have a few discouragements but why talk of them when Jesus is just the same today as in the ages past and God's promises are enabling. Our hearts often think of the dear ones at home, especially as alliance time comes around but so far we never, for one moment, have wanted to go back nor shrink from what we see to lie before us. It is sufficient to know God has sent us here and, though we do not always see results, we know his word cannot return unto him void and we say "we shall reap if we faint not."
