CORRESPONDENCE.

NORWALK, Cal., Feb. 16th, 1904.

Dear Highway.—I thought perhaps a few lines from me might be of interest to my many friends in the east; I have enjoyed your visits very much and the many helpful, soul stirring things written in your pages have been eagerly devoured by me. I am spending the winter at the home of my son in law, who is keeping a general store at this place. Norwalk is a small town of perhaps 200 inhabitants, situated on the line of S. P. R. R., 17 2/10 miles south of Los Angeles and in the midst of an extensive country of ranches and vineyards where grapes are grown for the distillery, which is carried on to a very large extent in this country, converting the good things of God into liquid damnation to replenish the wallets of a few at the cost of the souls of the sons of men. The temperance forces are well organized here, and many of the places in this state are under local option and have temperance voters enough to close the saloon. This town and a large part more of Southern California is voted dry and being looked after keenly by the temperance force, which is gaining ground in the state and are determined to fight this withering curse to the death. May God speed the day. This part of the State has been suffering severely by drouth, having had only about one inch of rain as they measure it here since last winter, whereas ordinarily, they would have had about eleven inches by this time, causing depression in business and much uneasiness amongst the ranchers. But I think the drouth is broken as it is coming down copiously whilst I write. There is a vast amount of crime and skepticism amongst the common people, disregard for the sabbath which is used by very many as a day of sport and recreation. Bowling Allies are run all day Sunday, and ball games are planned and appointed for different places. All R. R. trains run on schedule time same as on other days and if any are skeptical in regard to the time being here when, "Evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse" they have only to read the morning papers to be convinced; when I came here I was told that this was a hot-bed of skepticism and scoffers at the Christian religion. As I improved in health and got out amongst the people and at their churches, I did not wonder much at the church having no influence over the world as I found so many of the profound followers of Christ using the weed, and being active members of some secret order that took much of their time and means to support. There are three churches here viz., the Congregational, the Methodist and Seventh Day Advent. I have attended the Methodist church up to two Sundays past. The pastor appears to be a good living man but is not into the experience of Sanctification. He believes in growing up to it. There are a few straight Holiness people in the church, or rather who attend service with the Methodist people but do not belong to them. At the two last manger meetings on Wednesday nights a few leading members were called upon to pray and the Sunday School lesson was studied and not a single testimony by members of the church although liberty was given. The writer and two dear sisters got in testimonies to the power of God to save, possibly one of the sisters may be a member of the church. Feb. 7th I spent at Los Angeles, attended the First Methodist church and listened to an able discourse on the "Love of God" from the Rev. Mark Guy Pierce of London, there I learned of the church of "the Nazarene" and attended that in the afternoon and found a people full of the Holy Ghost fire and God wonderfully broke me up until I was free as a bird. Last Sabbath I took the morning train at 8.15 and went back to the same church and returned on 5.10 in the evening, got the Sunday School morning service and afternoon Holiness meeting. This is a very large church, will seat about one thousand and was about all full in the morning and hundreds appeared to join in the services which were deeply spiritual; souls sanctified or converted in each meeting. The people are very demonstrative and some of them indulged in the liveliest skipping and leaping for joy that I ever witnessed while the amens seemed to come from a hundred voices. The pastor is spoken of as deeply spiritual and his face shone with a halo of glory. I shall no doubt go there again. I am

improved very much in my bodily health and my soul is expanding. I am seeking to know more of God and improving every feasible opportunity for the strengthening of my spiritual being and God is wonderfully keep me. Praise His dear name. I am expecting (D. V.) to return in the spring and hope to meet the dear brethren at Beulah and also at Riverside. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. Amen.

WOODSTOCK, Feb. 12th, 1904.

Dear Highway.—No doubt some of your readers especially those whom I have visited and labored among during the fall and winter months might be anxious to know what has become of me.

Well, I left Woodstock the first of January, did not take a snow plow, and am as a result, a little behind time. It is rumored that the North Pole has shifted and is located somewhere between Grand Falls and the upper part of Aroostook, but I will not dispute the question. If it is much colder than it has been during January and February I don't wonder that they never could locate Franklin. I have travelled the country by team from fifteen miles above Caribou to Woodstock and never in my time have I passed over such bad roads. I have concluded my work under the Aroostook Holiness Association, having labored five months and a half. I have visited and taught from house to house and have been cordially received. Many have been reclaimed, a number converted, and several sanctified, and a grand welcome remains for a good man full of the Holy Ghost who may feel to follow my steps. I would not have you think that all the battles are fought and all are favorable to Holiness as taught in the word of God. Not by any means. While talking with a divine he said it was sad to have our meetings so given out that the people would think there was a difference. Say a Baptist meeting, a Methodist meeting and a Holiness meeting all in the town of Fort Fairfield. Are we not all holiness? Surely we are. My reply was and is, we may accept it as a theory but do not accept it as an experience, a definite second work of the Holy Ghost subsequent to regeneration. I find many who are ready to build with these bricks but deny the process of making.

I long to see the day when men will be honest, a day when every vessel will sail under its own colors. There are men who have fought, bled and died true to God and the experience given them to be perpetuated by us and we cannot say Goody, Goody. Sure we must fight if we would win. Increase our courage, Lord! Why did not the man of God come down from the building of the wall, because the work was great.

No compromise, thank God, in the heart of every true man. This principle remains. Let us man our own ships while we sail other seas, be as the British flag acknowledged by all as British.
