The experience of holiness or entire sanctification as we understand it, does not cut a person loose from all that is sacred to them, and set them adrift as Spiritual derelict upon the great sea of life, but it puts us in the position to fulfil all righteousness as revealed to us in the Word by the Holy Spirit. There is far too much laxity among holiness people doctorinely, and many are getting the idea that to be right they must dance to every irresponsible fellow's music who appoints himself a leader.
