That decision and the blessed experience he had obtained turned his thought and his work into another channel, and with the heavenly fire from home and country, obeying the call of God and feeling a great burden on his heart for perishing souls.

In the providence of God he was led westward, with his boat, and soon found himself at Head Harbor Island, Jonesport, in the month of September 1893. The word soon spread over the Island that Capt. D. Hilyard was a preacher and declaring that a man could be saved from all sin in this life. He was soon invited to Beals community and the revival broke out.
