QUARTERLY MEETING.

The Quarterly Meeting of the first district convened with the church at Marysville on Thursday evening March 9th W. B. Wiggins of Woodstock, preached. Pastor G. B. Trafton led the altar service and the blessing of God attended the exercises. The Friday afternoon service was led by W. B. Wiggins and three requested prayer and an excellent service was enjoyed. At 7.30 Friday evening Rev. S. Greenlaw from Millville preached from 1st. Jno. I. 7. An altar service followed with blessed results. The business session took place on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

As all the officers happened to be absent, pastor G. B. Trafton was chosen chairman pro tem. The following officers were then duly elected namely.

Boyer, from Victoria Corner church, Mrs. W. B. Wiggins from Woodstock, B. R. Burt and Mrs. S. Greenlaw from Millville, Moses Young and Graham Blaney from Maple Ridge, Frank Mitchell from Penniac, W. L. Estabrook and J. A. McDonald from Marysville and Bro. George Hyde representing the Fredericton Mission. Some inquiries were made in regard to the Secretary's book and a resolution was carried that the Secretary be a committee to secure it and have it on hand for next Quarterly meeting. The reports from the churches were encouraging. Hartland church reported that a gracious revival was in progress, keeping both pastor and delegates home, that twenty had been baptized and many had been reclaimed and sanctified and the influence of the meetings had been far reaching and powerful. Woodstock reported that God's blessing attended the services, the congregations were increasing and some had been converted and sanctified. The finances of the church were in good condition, Sunday school increasing in numbers and interest also the missionary society had doubled in membership with increasing interest. Maple Ridge church had good meetings and prospect of a revival. Millville had two prayer meetings during the week besides the regular preaching services which were seasons of blessing. They thought much of the work of their pastor. Marysville had seasons of refreshing from the presence of the Lord and the pastor had been assisted lately by Brother P. J. Trafton and a number had been converted, reclaimed and sanctified. Sunday school was increasing in interest and the church was on the upward grade. MRS. WESLEY CHUTE.

Annie C., wife of Wesley Chute died at her home, Somerville, Mass., on the evening of Monday March 13th, after an illness of only a few minutes duration of heart trouble.

Mrs. Chute was a resident of Carleton County, having been born at Waterville on February 13th, 1871, and was consequently 34 years and 1 month old. She was a daughter of the late Capt. George True a gentleman well known in this and the adjoining counties of York and Sunbury. She leaves beside a sorrowing husband, four children the youngest two months and the oldest nine years old, also an aged mother, two brothers and one sister in Massachusetts, two brothers and one sister in this vicinity. The remains by the wish of the deceased expressed some time previous to her death, were brought back to the land of her nativity for burial, arriving in Woodstock by the noon train on Thursday the 16th inst., accompanied by the husband; and were met at the depot by a large number of sorrowing relatives and friends.

The funeral service took place at 3 o'clock, p. m., at the Waterville church, conducted by the Rev. F. A. Currier assisted by the Rev's. Todd and Bonnell and were very impressive. The floral offering which accompanied the remains spoke of the esteem in which she was held in the land of her adoption. Mrs. Chute was baptised about 20 years ago by the Rev. Stephen Currie, since which time she had lived a conscientious Christian life.—Com.
