THE ALLIANCE AND CAMP MEETING.

The Alliance in many points was as good, if not the best ever held at Beulah. The number of delegates present at the beginning of the business sessions was the largest for several years. The expedition in disposing of the business of the Alliance was better than previous years. The harmony which prevailed was an excellent feature of the meeting. The reports of the churches were cheerful and full of faith and encouragement, showing a fair gain in membership, and the contributions for sustaining the various departments of the work were excellent, being in excess of former years.

The Sunday school report shows a good, vigorous work in this department in increased numbers, in conversions, and financially.

The missionary work and contributions exceed all former years, the aggregate amount contributed during the year being fully \$2,500.00. And this department of our work has been given great impetus by the spontaneous and generous liberality of the people in our annual missionary meeting, which exceeded any former meeting, and was supplemented by a collection taken on board the steamer, while the up river people were on their way home. The full amount will be given in the regular report.

Another encouraging feature of the Alliance was that four young men offered themselves for the gospel ministry, and after careful examination as to their call and doctrine, they were recommended to be licensed.

The success of THE HIGHWAY as the denominational organ during the past year was a source of satisfaction and encouragement.

The past year has been a successful one to our little band of holiness people and the future is full of promise, so we have every reason to thank God and take courage.

The Camp Meeting was one of the best we have ever held at Beulah. Brother Hoople has grown much as a preacher since he was with us five years ago. He is a good preacher and worker and will certainly take his place among the leading evangelists. He is sound, safe and helpful. The

greater number of the people who attend Beulah are already in the experience of full salvation, so that the work is largely that of strengthening and building up and enlargement of the experience, as well as of conversion and sanctification. There were good results in every phase of the work. The meetings were full of spiritual life and power and were greatly enjoyed by all present. Every department was well managed and financially successful. We need more rooms and more bedding, as many more would come if they could get accommodations. The attendance was larger than the previous year and every department of the meeting was a grand success, for which we praise God. Our own ministers deserve their share of the credit for the success of the meeting. Their preaching was highly appreciated and was always attended by blessed results. Rev. John Gravinor who is now our senior minister; proved himself an excellent presiding officer. Brother J. F. Bullock contributed largely to the interest of the meetings by prompt, faithful and efficient presiding at the organ. Brother P. J. Trafton led the singing in many of the services; in fact every man found his place and did efficient work. The same can be said of many of the sisters, as they had opportunity. So Beulah Camp Meeting closed for 1905 by a general hand shake while the tabernacle rang as all joined in singing "You Look for me I'll be There," and the benediction by the writer.

BALMORAL FARM.

"Our South African Missionary Farm Fund," is steadily growing. The people did excellently last year, but it is needful for us to continue the good work. We must secure a good title to the farm before we can build permanent buildings to any great value. The wisdom of this is apparent to all. The amount of money needed for this purpose is about \$2,500. One third of the amount is already pledged and \$600 cash already paid in. Every member of the Reformed Baptist body, and every one interested in establishing missionary work on holiness lines should assist in this foundation work. There is no department of the work more important than the purchase of the land upon which to build our station, for it is the short road to make our "mission station" self supporting, and to secure us against loss, by building on leased land. Everything should be in our favor, in raising this money quickly. 1st. Our people are personally acquainted with our missionary. 2nd. It is, or should be, of individual interest to all of our people; 3rd. The amount asked of each person is small. 4th. It is an opportunity to do permanent work for God that will reach to coming generations. 5th. We are receiving immediate results from the work being done there, as conversions are frequently taking place. So we might continue to give reasons why we should invest in this grand soul saving enterprise, but a word to the wise is sufficient. Send your pledges for the amount you will agree to pay by June 1st 1906. The whole amount should be pledged in a very brief period. Rex. H. H. Cosman has been appointed house missionary, by the board, for the 3rd district. Rev. G. B. Macdonald will probably succeed him on the circuit, comprising Port Maitland, Sandford, Brazil Lake, and Cedar Lake N. S.

Licentiate Henry Smith will remain at Beulah Camp Ground until about the first of September, after which he will become pastor of Calais and Pembroke, Maine Churches. Rev. A. W. Morrell will supply the above churches until Brother Smith can take charge.

Waterville church is to be painted and put in readiness for a holiness convention, to take place at as early a date as can be arranged.

Events came in quick succession to Rev. J. F. Keirstead at the Alliance. He was accepted as a missionary to South Africa, was ordained, and married to our other missionary elect Miss Ida Morgan. They will take passage for South Africa probably the last of September.
